

Diamond Jubilee of Confederation Occurs Next Year.

Some of the Main Features

The Committee feel that the proposed celebration should have three characteristics:

1. It should be on a big scale, worthy of the occasion and of the country, and such as will impress both our own people and the outside world.

2. Certain main features of the program should be common to every city, town and hamlet from coast to coast, so as to create a feeling that all Canada is joining together in a big Birthday Party.

3. The children should be given a prominent part in the program, so that a lasting impression may be made on the minds of the rising generation.

4. A salute to be fired by electricity from Ottawa in every Provincial capital and city where there is artillery stationed.

5. National and Local Banquets. A great national banquet to be held at Ottawa and broadcasted from one end of Canada to the other.

6. Where practicable, special programs on Saturday, July 2nd, to feature distinctively Canadian sports, such as lacrosse and canoeing.

7. Services of national re-dedication and consecration on Sunday, July 3rd, in every place of worship in Canada, if possible at the same hour, so that the church bells will summon Canadians of every denomination from coast to coast to acknowledge at the same moment their fealty to God.

In introducing Mr Edwards to the audience at his Mt Forest meeting, Dr Beacom, V.S., who was chairman, did so as follows: "This is the man who is going to knock the stuffings out of Miss MacPhail."

Premier Ferguson at the Meighen meeting in Massey Hall, Toronto, predicted in his speech which was heard over the radio, that "the distinguished lady member for South East Grey would soon be extinguished."

Proton had the largest township vote. There was a large increase over last year in votes polled, every ward in the Riding showing more or less of an increase.

Durham Conservatives would not admit more than 300 to 700 riding majority for Miss MacPhail, and received an unpleasant surprise when their figures were boosted by over 1000.

The Conservative candidate, Mr. Edwards, thanked his supporters at their committee rooms here about 9.30 p.m. when returns were mostly in.

How the Country Went

The election shows a turnover in favor of the Liberal party. The summary of Wednesday gives the Liberals 118, Conservatives 90, Progressives 7, Liberal-Progress 11, U.F.A. 11, Labor 3, Ind. 2, doubtful 3.

If the "Liberal-Progress 11" can be reckoned with the Liberals, King will have a majority over all.

Ontario sends 26 Liberals, Saskatchewan 60, Man. and New Brunswick 4 each, Nova Scotia and Alberta 2 each, B. Columbia only 1 and P.E.I. 2 members.

Telford, Liberal, is elected in N. Grey by 526; Malcolm, Liberal, in N. Bruce; Hall, Lib. in S. Bruce; McKenzie King elected in Prince Albert; Meighen defeated in Portage la Prairie; Forke elected; Stevens, who exposed the customs scandal, elected in Vancouver; No fewer than 5 of Meighen's "shadow cabinet" defeated; Speaker Lemieux elected; R. S. White, (C.) elected, Hamilton and Ottawa each elect two Liberals. Toronto and two Yorks went solidly Conservative, all Liberal members lost their deposits.

Patenaude, Doucet, Nicholson, Rogers, prominent Conservatives, all defeated.

The men in Quebec who were members in the King cabinet all re-elected.

Telford in North Grey is the first Liberal to represent the Riding, since his father 22 years ago.

Drury cut the majority of Boys in North Simcoe, but not enough to win. Not many rural majorities in the Dominion are greater than Miss MacPhail's. A year ago 1407. This year 1722. There will be no recount.
