The two pupils entering the former contest were Arthur Redford of U. 2, (Habermehl) and Esther Riddell of S. S. No. 13. For the latter contest, Nellie Stinson of S. S. No. 9 (Crawford) and Geo. Robinson of S. S. No. 7 (Hoey's). The girls in both cases won out.
