**Ferguson Succumbs
to the Wets**

ELECTION DAY, DECEMBER 1
W. F. Nickle, Attorney General, declares the Ship

At last the announcement is made and a Provincial Election is to be held on Wednesday, Dec. 1st. Only six weeks to Polling Day.

The Premier after apparent hesitation has decided that dissolution is better than holding 10 by-elections, half of which are over a year vacant, and the going uncertain.

The salient point in the contact is to be the O. T. A. In the contest of the inner circle during the past month or two, the wets have won and we are to have "Government Control and local option." The right of the doctors to issue prescriptions is taken away and given to a "Commission." It provides for the sale of alcoholic liquor in limited quantities through Government dispensaries, and permits the sale of beer in hotels where the municipality has declared in favor of such sale by a three-fifths majority.

Practically this seems going back to conditions before the O. T. A. This seems to be the view taken by W. F. Nickle, Mr Ferguson's ablest minister for failing to agree with the Ferguson wet policy, he has resigned the Attorney Generalship, with its emoluments, all for the sake of principle, an action surely worthy of commendation.

Mr Ferguson will meet with many Mr. Nickle's, he has lost the confidence of a great body of public opinion and we hope Ontario, rural and urban, will defeat his candidates in sufficient number to overthrow his administration, that threatens to destroy moral issues in Ontario.
