Proton Ploughing Match was a Success

Four inches of snow on Monday, Oct. 18th, covered the fields. The date appointed was a failure and Oct. 23rd was chosen. Between dates, Jupiter Pluvius reigned supreme and Saturday morning was cold and dull with frequent snow flurries.

The field chosen was on the farm of Albert Fraser, a former R. D. Fraser holding. The large maple grove of G. A. Johnson proved a valuable windbreak which added greatly to the comfort of all. Sixteen single and four four-horse teams arrived early as led the judge, Mr Jas. McLean of Richmond Hill, to the plowmen before the start. In a few well chosen remarks he pictured an ideal ploughed land explaining how to reach the objective. He invited each plowman to ask questions during the day. All day he continued to follow the plowman correcting and improving. The sky cleared and noon found a booth supplied with eatables for the plowmen who were given a free lunch by the farm women of the township. The latter are a great help when organized and was a great aid to the success of the match. Lunch, hot tea and refreshments were sold during the afternoon.

All crows finished, the plowmen deepened their furrows. A decided improvement over former matches was evident. The field was a clay loam with a pleasing incline, heavy enough to grip the plow, yet entirely free from small stones. The best Mr McLean has judged this Autumn.

Several amateurs had entered and made a creditable showing. Should they continue to grip the handles firmer there is every evidence that they will rival their more experienced fellows.

The latter by applying experience and acquired knowledge with good horsemanship, produced work best only by experts. Four four-horse teams driven with almost the same precision as the single teamers, drew unstinted praise from many spectators. Forty eight horses and twenty teamsters slowly and staid in their manner, was a rare treat to horse lovers or a plowman.

A splendid spirit of sportsmanship was displayed at all times by all plowmen. About 300 spectators viewed the work under adverse conditions. The directors are to be congratulated on the success of the match. The prize winners are:
