Continued from Page 1 grants, the less the town will be called upon to pay. He proposed the \$25,000 estimate cost be spread over a period of 20 years, the yearly debt expenditure then being about \$1500.

There is also an extra maintenance grant, and 50 per cent of annual debt payments can be included in cost of maintenance. This would mean \$500 extra in the Co. maintenance grant.

There is again a large Entrance class of 38 in Durham. Mr Graham would probably pass all, and with the influx from country schools, two First Forms will doubtless be required next fall.
