Just one item this week—that in which all the people of this locality are interested, the death of Robert Kinnel, which took place in Toronto General Hospital last Saturday a. m.

Mr Kinnel had been unwell for some time, his disease baffling the doctors at home. Two weeks ago he was able to get up and dress himself and go to the city, Mrs Kinnel going with him. Though not suffering much, he complained of his head. The x-ray was used and a something discovered. An operation was decided upon. After going to the hospital the trouble rapidly developed and sometimes he did not know his friends. The operation was performed on Thursday last, when a large tumor was removed which rested on the brain. And in about 36 hours he passed away.

Mr Kinnel was 54 years of age, and three months ago was helping the neighbors with the threshing and other work. All were shocked to learn of his death. The body was brought home Saturday night and the funeral held at Sw. Park cemetery on Monday. Undertaker Gamble of Dundalk had charge. Rev. Mr. Spencer of Dundalk, held a short service at the house. The burial service was conducted by the Orange Order, of which Mr Kinnel was a most prominent member.

After burial, all repaired to the church, where Mr Spencer, assisted by Rev. Mr. Storms of Hopeville, conducted service. A very large gathering of neighbors and friends showed their respect for deceased by their presence.

'Bob' was well and widely known for his friendly disposition and a general favorite. A great void is felt in the community, but especially in the home and for Mrs Kinnel, daughters Mary, (Mrs Palmer Phillips) of Toronto and Miss Marjorie, sons Louis and Murray at home and Wallace of Detroit. All extend heartfelt sympathy in this their time of sorrow. The pall bearers were six chums through life: Hugh McMillan, W. A. Richardson, Geo. Haw, John and Robt. Parslow and Thos. Acherson.

Mr Kinnel took a deep interest in the Orange Society. He was a staunch conservative—everyone knew on which side he stood. At our annual school meetings we will miss him much as he always favored do by his presence. He was in the best interests of the children regardless of cost. Those of us who have known Bob throughout his life, are sorry for his death at so young an age and all can look back with pleasant memories. We are glad that we knew him and felt his cheerful disposition.

The first debating of the season among the young People's Clubs of this locality, was that between the two neighboring sections, Rocky Saugeen and Edge Hill, at the latter school house on Tuesday evening. Mr. Howard Ritchie, the new president of Edge Hill club, was chairman and had splendid order throughout. As well as the debate, a splendid program was given, music being predominant. In his remarks as critic Mr Wheelan stated had more points or arguments on the question, those of the affirmative weighed heavier. Mr. Wheelan especially complimented Miss Kathleen Firth on her debating ability.

The literary program over, a luncheon was far removed from the five o'clock tea variety, was served all. On Friday of this week "Onward" Club of South Armesia and Bunessan will engage in the same debate at the former Club. Miss Mary Beaton and Mr Eldon Weppeler are the Bunessan team.
