

RAISE SPEED LIMIT ON ONTARIO ROADS

Gov't to increase Legal Rate from 25 to 35 miles an hour

Legalizing procedure already tacitly recognized by certain traffic court magistrates, the Ontario Gov't proposes to institute legislation during the coming session by which the speed limit on the highways will be raised from 25 to 35 miles an hour. This has been made known to the press by the Premier and Hon. G. S. Henry, Minister of Highways.

In addition, legislation wil be introduced providing for the carrying of lights by all vehicles and the recognition of all provincial highways as "stop" streets.

Last fall the government endorsed the "stop-street" regulation by order-in-council, but the order did not become effective Evidently the government feels that such an arbitrary promulgation should have the force of legislative approval behind it.

It was also intimated that the regulation passed last year requiring permits for all auto vehicle drivers will become effective this year. It now only requires proclamation to come into effect.

Wih respect to possible legislation reguiring motor vehicles to stop before crossing railway tracks, to which the government is said to have given considerable attention, the suggestion was given out that no action in that regard would be taken this year the feeling being that such a measure might have the effect of relieving the railways of responsibility for accidents arising out of
