Ltd., has been taken over by a newly organized merger, the Canadian Department Stores Ltd., which at present consists of 22 stores located in the best towns and cities of Ontario. J. C. Engel and the entire staff will be retained to run the business. It is claimed by the promoters that quantities of cash direct from manufacturers will cut out middlemen's profits, and effect a saving of from 15 to 30 per cent to the consumers.

Jury Return Verdict of "Accidental Death"

Wednesday afternoon in the Town Hall, the inquest relating to the death of the late John Highley, who figured in a fatal motor accident on Oct. 25th last at McWilliams was held. The jury who comprised Messrs Rob Whitmore, John Snell, Ab. Noble, G. Noble, M. Steinacher, Geo. Campbell, Geo. McKechnie, John Dobney, and A. G. McComb as foreman, were first up to the hospital to interview Mrs. Highley, who is still a patient there. From here they adjourned to the Town Hall where they listened to evidence given by Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Moore and daughter Esther of McWilliams, Dr. D. B. Jamieson, Conductor Campbell, Engineer Moore and other railway officials of the C. P.R. Crown Attorney Dyer of Owen Sound was present and cautioned the jury as to the seriousness of the situation as to the pending verdict they were about to bring in.

The evidence heard at the Town Hall was of about two hours' duration and after summing the matter up, the jury brought in a verdict of "purely accidental death." Dr. Brown of Hanover was Coroner.

Sudden Death of Geo. Lewis

It was with a very deep sense of sadness and gloom and regret that the news was passed around on Monday last, of the sudden passing out of one of the most highly respected citizens in the person of Mr. George Lewis, many not hearing of his brief illness. Just a week previous, deceased was in Holstein and on Tuesday following assisted with the chores on the farm, usually known as the Torry farm.

While on his way home walking he was taken with a severe pain in the region of the heart. He was a heavy and big man, weighing 230 pounds. The following morning he was unable to leave the bed. Dr. McLellan of Holstein was hastily summoned and administered relief for the time being at least, knowing however that the trouble was deep seated, being low blood pressure.

Friday last he was able to be up for a little spell, but on Saturday became somewhat worse. Sunday he was nothing improved but became very ill, the Dr. being constantly in attendance, the patient's temperature being as low as 80 degrees at times, but through skilled aid was able to keep alive. But gradually the heart grew weaker and weaker and he passed away about 9 o'clock Monday morning.

Dr. D. B. Jamieson had been hastily called early in the morning for consultation and after making a creditable effort to get down, just got to the gate when the life in the once strong rugged frame blinked out.

The deceased was one of our best farmers at the 'Corners', kind and obliging and widely and favorably known by a large circle of friends and highly respected.

Beginning about 30 years ago as a wage earner and a wife to support, through honest toil and energy, he owned at his death, over 300 acres of fine tillable land—surely a fine object lesson for others of what may be accomplished by thrift and pluck.

Very uncommon the deceased was the first break in a large family of brothers and sisters.

The deceased will be much missed in the neighborhood and leaves behind as chief mourners his wife and six of a family, viz: Elton in Bentinck; Ella, (Mrs. Wes. Ball) of Durham; Maggie, Willie, Bert and Kelly at home.

Also five brothers; Jas. in Egremont; Robt. and Charlie on the Provincial Highway and Harry and John in the West; four sisters—Barbara (Mrs Thos. Kirby); Maggie, (Mrs Jake Stevenson); Lizzie, (Mrs Dowling); Edith, Mrs McEachern; Kezziah, (Mrs John Main).

To the grief-stricken widow and family, in the loss of a kind husband and father, we extend the sympathy of the whole community.
