### IN SHIPMENTS OF WOOL

Grey Co. again leads all Ontario counties in co-operative wool shipments for the year just closed, with Simcoe in second place, followed by York, Peel, Haldimand and Ontario. In 1925, the same County was on top, but York was in second place, being less than a couple of hundred pounds ahead of Simcoe. The year previous to that saw Simcoe in first place, being followed by Grey, Wellington, Ontario and York.

Judging by these figures, which have just been compiled by the Canadian Co-operative Wool Grawers. there has been a remarkable expansion in sheep breeding in many Ortario counties during the past few years. Grey alone increased wool shipments from 44,127 pounds in 1925, to 49,555 in 1926 at the same time reporting an increase of 19 shippers. Simcoe and York did al most as well, while Peel showed the remarkable gain of over 20 per cent in a single season, having shipped 29,250 pounds in 1925, against 36,200
