HIGHER POST BOX RATES AFFECT CERTAIN OFFICES

Commencing last week end, rates of lock boxes in certain Post Offices are increased. In connection with increased rates, the Dist. Superintendent of Post Offices, Alexander M. Gibson, said:

"The advanced rate mentioned for C, B and C boxes, namely \$2, \$3 and \$6, is applicable in the case of offices where Postmasters are paid by percentage on revenue, the office located in a public building and where there is no letter carrier delivery. It is therefore incorrect to say,"

Miss MacPhail, M. P. Relates Doings at Ottawa

(The following is in part a letter South East Grey's member sent out last week to many of her electors, giving her viewpoint on present day questions before the House.—Ed.) Georgian Bay Canal Controversy "We have been talking about the granting of the charter to the Sifton interests for the construction of the Georgian Bay canal. This charter has been granted 13 times. They have made no attempt to build the canal and the general opinion is that they never intend to, but that they want the right to develop the power of the Ottawa River. The House and the country are up in arms and I feel sure it will never be granted. The Holt interests, a private concern in Montreal, also wants the power at Ottawa. What a large part of the House want is to stop either of them getting it, and have the power developed by the Province. House to adjourn at 11 p.m.7 The rules of the House have been before us for amendments. The Bill has not passed all its stages, but if it does the House will adjourn every night at 11 p.m. and no member except the Prime Minister, the introducer of a Bill, the Leader of the Opposition, may exceed 40 min. when speaking. One can hardly believe that we will have no more night sittings. It will be very much better for the health of the members, and I think would work out better in every way. Contract soon to be let The contracts for Durham Post Office are to be let soon, the Minister of Public Works informs me. Visited Kingston Penitentiary Since I last wrote you I have visited Kingston Penitentiary and was shown a very bit of it by the Warden and the Inspector, who happened to be there that day. There are 704 men and 25 women. So many of them are but boys. They look between 20 and 25—a good-looking lot of fellows. Considering that the Act is based on vengeance by the State, those who carry on the work, the Superintendent, Warden and Matron, seem to have been able to do wonders toward making the penitentiary a place to reform rather than revenge. The Act needs changing but men are now taught to be shoemakers with up-to-date machinery, tent makers, machinists, stone cutters, cooks, waiters, etc and no one is barking stone. I was much impressed with the matron. The Inspector told me he considered her the most wonderful woman he had ever known. She is but 26 years of age, very good looking and well dressed. The last sort of person one would expect to be matron in a penitentiary. She has such influence over the women that they love her so much that there is almost no trouble in the women's ward, Mr Jackson, the Inspector told me. Spoke to Queen's Students I also addressed the United Farmers of Frontenac County on occupational organization, and its effects on Government and the same night spoke to the women students of Queen's. Three or four years ago, I would not have been allowed, much less invited to address University students. This year I have been invited to McGill at Montreal and at Toronto University, as well as at Queen's. The general opinion is that we will be through here by Easter. Everybody is in debt over the two elections in one year, and there seems a general desire to get through. Maritime Provinces Dissatisfied I think the National Defence estimates and the Immigration estimates will be held up. The Maritime Provinces are getting almost everything they asked for, except subsidies to their coal industry. I do not think that what they are offering is the solution to the Maritime problem. If they could trade with those immediately south, they could find a good market with the short freight haul, and these three smaller Provinces certainly do not need three governments. One Government for three would cut the expense and serve them quite as well. Their methods of farming and other things are away behind Ontario and the other Provinces. I know, however, that conditions are very bad there and that people are almost hopeless. They have lost the ability to help themselves. It is getting near seeding time and I very much hope that we have a good year." Yours sincerely, Agnes C. Macphail
