Earliest Settlers in Priceville Locality

From an old friend, Mr John A. McDonald, we have received the following sketch of Priceville's earliest days. It is as follows:

At your request, I am sending you names of the original settlers in Priceville. 1st, the name was taken from the surveyor Price who surveyed the Durham Road in the year 1818 and on halting at the now village, the name Priceville was proposed by the feeble in the locality. The original Priceville was on Glenelg side, now called the 'Highland Hills'.

Two hotels or whiskey shops were early established there, one kept by the late Donald McLean and another by the late John McCulloch, in the early 50's.

When I was a boy I remember the late John Kennedy who worked for McCulloch, bringing a wagon load of whiskey about the year 1855, and the contents lasted only a month or two. The settlers then thought it incumbent upon them to patronize the proprietor by taking home a jugful of the palatable stuff which was only 50c a gal. An old Highlander man said "By gosh it's goot stuff McCulloch keeps."

Another old Highlander kept what was called a store at that time, by the name of McQuarrie and was asked how he kept his books as he had no education. He said "the wife has a good memory and she remembers all she sells." How would that suit the merchants nowadays?

We'll now, lets go over the big hill east of the Highland Hills and there I find the first citizen in the new village as Mrs John McAuley, who put up the first log cabin on the Durham Road on Artemesia side. A way down east where Frank Reilly's shop stands, was a Dan McDonald, who put up the other log house.

Down further the late Sager Tryon started a hotel about 1855 and the late Wm. Purdy put up a small store at the foot of the hill in 1853 which was a great convenience to the new settlers in getting tea, tobacco, soda, soap and other small articles. The late E. B. McMillan kept hotel as early as 1855, followed by Kennedy Bros. for awhile.

Another hotel was where the Presbyterian manse now stands—I forget the man's name. The late John McDonald put up the first grist mill in 1857 and was a great convenience. Cyril Vaudner, big Donald McDonald, Edward McDonald and little Donald McDonald (Mrs J. H. Hunter's brother) were prominent in these early days.

Peter Beverage put up the tannery, later run by C. C. James and now the property of the Misses James. Dr. Ghent, Dr Burns, Dr Bennett were early medics: Chas McMillan, plasterer: Dougal McLean, shoemaker; Matthew, Thos., Robert and Wm. Conkey, the latter yet living in Ferguson, Alex Ferguson, agent; Francis Walte, blacksmith; Alex Webster, merchant; John Simpson, cabinet maker; E. H. Evans, carriage maker; Ferguson Wright, teacher; Alex McNeil, retired farmer (father of Dr. McNeil, Chicago, who made a present of the McNeil cemetery at the town line); Wm McDonald, retired farmer; Duncan McFayden, a shoemaker; G. Yeomans, merchant; J. H. Yeomans, merchant; Robert and John Hall, merchants; Joseph Dixon, merchant; Wm Ferguson, superintendent of schools and who kept the Post Office on the hills called Artemesia for a time; and others, were community builders of the 50's. All these are the original citizens who have passed away many years ago with the exception of Wm Conkey, who is yet living in Ferguson.
