Away down east where Frank Reilly's shop stands, was a Dan McDonald, who put up the other log house. Down further the late Sager Tryon started a hotel about 1855 and the late Wm. Purdy put up a small store at the foot of the hill in 1853 which was a great convenience to the new settlers in getting tea, tobacco, soda, soap and other small articles. The late E. B. McMillan kept hotel as early as 1855, followed by Kennedy

Bros. for awhile. Another hotel was where the Pres byterian manse now stands-I forget the man's name. The late John Mc-Donald put up the first grist mill in 1857 and was a great convenience. Cyril Vaudner, big Donald McDonald. Edward McDonald and little Donald McDonald (Mrs J. H. Hunter's brother) were prominent in these early
