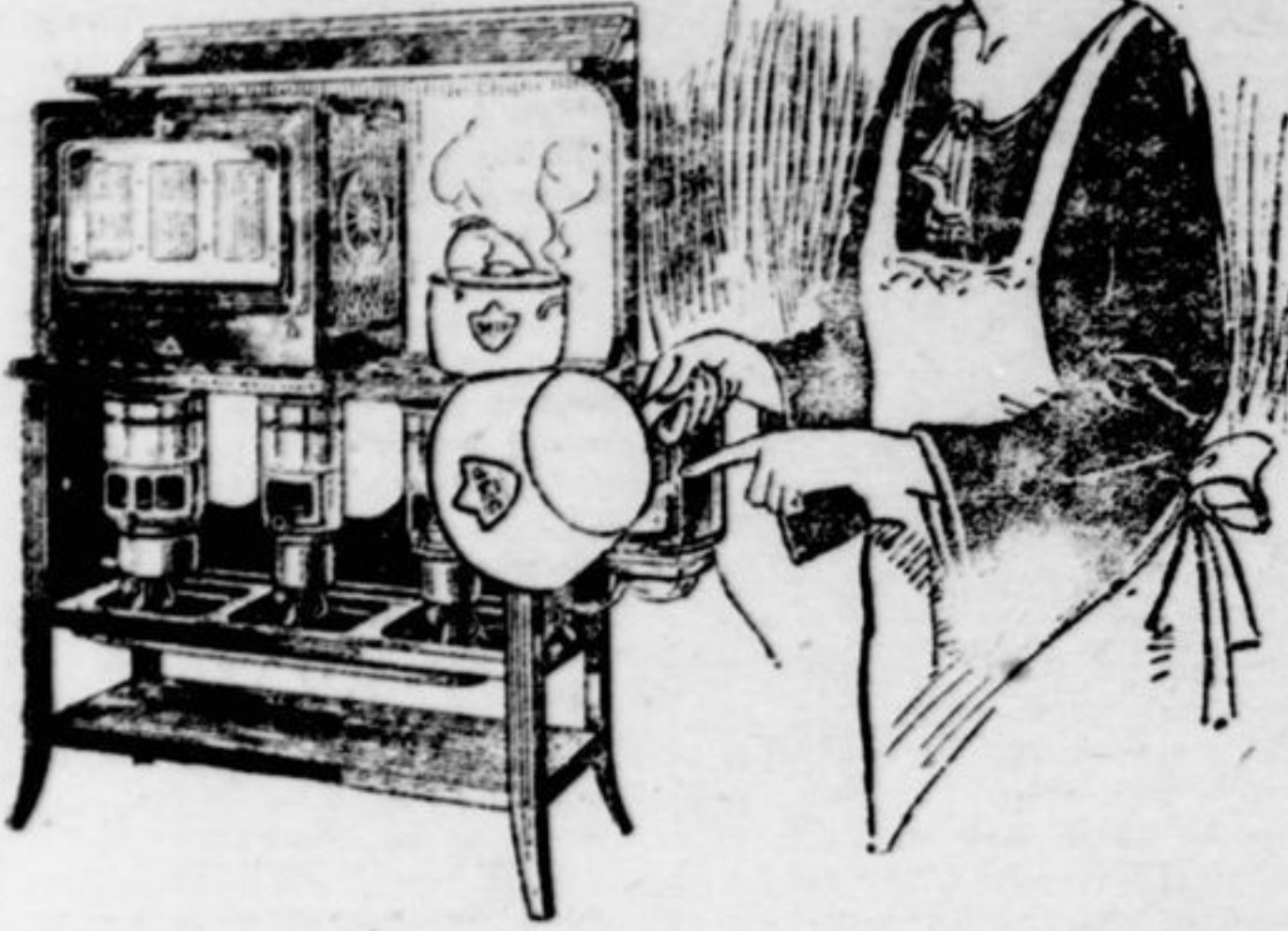

THE BOOZE BUSINESS CANKER

Under the above heading the Globe of Saturday last had the most scathing article we have seen on the humiliating discoveries being made by the Royal Commission as to the perversion of the liquor traffic. It will stand twice reading. The revelation should lead to such a strengthening of public opinion as would bury forever Booze and John Barleycorn. Here is the article:

"It must be patent to everyone that the Customs inquiry is a booze inquiry. The Royal Commission is investigating Customs administration with a view to discovering weaknesses and suggesting improvements. And nearly every trail it strikes leads to liquor.

Is the big sales tax being collected promptly? When it asks this question it finds that hundreds of thousands of dollars are overdue from liquor interests.

Have the Department Auditors ready access to necessary records? Books of brewery after brewery are missing.

Are business firms conducting the sales end of their enterprises in a way which can be checked up easily? Brewers and distillers are selling to men they do not know; fictitious names are used; there are wheels within wheels, relaying of orders; to create blind ends, bogus addresses, juggled bank accounts.

Are shipping orders recorded so that they can be checked with sales? When it comes to liquor, shipments go into the dark unknown—the darker the more preferable—camouflaged, switched and twisted until their destination is lost in mystery.

Is the ethics of business such that it may reasonably be assumed that the Government can rely upon the integrity of business firms to make honest returns? Again this business proves to be an exception, and shows that almost every conceivable trick is adopted at some point to escape responsibility.

The investigation has revealed a trail of evasion, bribery and corruption leading to booze centres or booze handlers. This sort of thing has occupied the greater part of the time of the Commission, and wherever it has sat. The most astounding practices have been disclosed, practices which no respectable man engaged in legitimate trade would think of following.

Why should this be? Why should a business be permitted to exist which makes it necessary to monopolize the attention of an expensive Commission? Why should the people of Canada be obliged to pay hundreds of thousands of dollars to follow up the crookedness of a traffic which, at best, is nothing but a source of debauchery? Why should Parliament be obliged to vote a huge sum for machinery to enforce the law, when almost the only offenders are connected with a branch of trade of no economic value to the country and of vast economic loss?

The farther the Royal Commission goes with the liquor traffic the deeper the mire becomes. There does not appear to be a solid bottom anywhere. Is there any use in ever expecting to find one?

Is it necessary for a country to endure this, to tolerate the existence of a canker which is eating away its morals and its business ethics?"
