There will be 150 to 200 in the party, which will travel in Arrow motor busses, where the party being all together, find it more congenial travelling than in private cars. The sole object of the hike is to advertise Listowel.

On Saturday last, Mayor John Watson, of Listowel, President, accompanied by W. P. Rennie, Vice Pres., and E. S. Hudson, Sec'y Treas. of the Chamber of Commerce and editor of the Listowel Banner, were in Durham making preliminary arrangements for the day's outing.

The visitors leave Listowel at 5:00 a.m., bringing their band with them. They will stop at Mt. Forest a few minutes, reach Durham about 10:15 a.m., give some band music and spend half an hour, stop at Chatsworth to serenade the natives and have dinner at Central United Ch. Owen Sound. Early afternoon will be spent in sports and sightseeing there, and returning, the Listowel tourists will reach Durham about 5:30 and have supper in the Town Hall here, served by the Ladies' Guild of Trinity Church. More band music will enliven the time before they proceed home. Durham at present has no Board of Trade or Chamber of Commerce to greet the visitors, but on behalf of the town, the Review extends a cordial welcome, and trusts that Council and citizens will tender a friendly reception.

Mrs. Dr. J. L. Smith Passes Away Tuesday

The town was startled and saddened on Tuesday, to learn that the above lady had passed away that forenoon. For a number of years she has not been in robust health, but a fatal termination was not looked for. She was a sufferer from chronic bronchitis and rheumatism and a severe attack of grippe on Saturday last, ended as above narrated.

She was in her 65th year, born in Glenelg, and lived there until her marriage to Dr. Smith in 1893, and since that in Dornoch, till moving to Durham nearly nine years ago. Their marriage was the first performed by Rev. John Little when inducted at Dornoch. Their only son Morrison, is at present at Mt. Clemens, Mich., an engineer on a government road.

The deceased was Miss Annie Morrison, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Morrison (nee Isabella McCallum) and a member of a large family, of whom there survive: Duncan, of Glenelg; John, of Durham; Margaret, teacher, Toronto; Peter and Donald, New Westminster, B. C.; Dougald, of Oakville, Manitoba, and Isabella, Mrs. Jas. Ledingham, Glenelg.

Mrs. Smith was a cultured Christian woman. For many years before and 26 years after her marriage she was a teacher and standby in Dornoch Sunday School. She took warm interest in the W. M. S. of which she was Treasurer and a life member, and all who knew her testify to her intelligent and warm interest in every uplift work.

In the sacred relation of wife and mother, she was deeply loving and beloved. In every social duty as neighbor and friend, she was not found wanting. Her memory will long be green to those who knew her. The funeral services will be held today, Thursday in Knox Church by her pastor, Rev. W. H. Smith. Interment in Durham cemetery.

To the mourners, the Review joins in the general expression of sympathy.

Death of Don. Livingstone, a Bentinck Pioneer

One of Bentinck Township's early pioneers, Donald Livingstone, entered into his reward on Friday evening, May 27th, at his home No. 29, con. 9. On this homestead he was born almost seventy years ago and here he spent his entire life.

In his younger days the deceased was a man of great physical strength, but for the last ten years he has been crippled with rheumatism and incapacitated for most farm work. He retained good use of his hands however and could perform tasks which permitted sitting, until this spring, when his arms also became affected.

He moved around however until the last, and Friday afternoon was outside, when his sister noticed him commencing to fall, and assisted him. Calling their brother Duncan, they took him in and placed him on the couch, and shortly after paralysis set in on one side of the body. He lapsed into unconsciousness and peacefully passed away a few hours later.

The deceased was the youngest son of the late Alexander and Mrs. Livingstone, (nee Annie McKinnon). Of a family of nine children, only three now survive: his brother Duncan and sister Christena, with whom he resided and brother Malcolm of Elmwood. His oldest brother Donald, died at 14 years, before deceased's birth: John, over 30 years ago, a sister, Mrs. D. McDonald (Jennie) 26 years ago and two other sisters in infancy.

The late Mr. Livingstone in days of good health was a regular attendant at Crawford Presbyterian church. He was known as a righteous and God-fearing man, deeply interested in the Lords work and had a profound love for the word of God. He was meek and retiring in disposition, possessing unerring judgment and sound common sense, and one of the most highly respected citizens of the locality. The funeral service Monday was

conducted by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Young of Crawford United Church, who spoke from Psalm 107, verse 2: "So He giveth his beloved sleep."

Rev. Mr. Crickington of Mulock Baptist church, assisted in the service. Interment was made in Rocky Saugene cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs Arch and Jas. McBoagall, Donald McDonald, Edward Boyle, Alex. Brown, Andrew Hastie, Wm. Cook, And. Milne.

Among the many beautiful floral tributes banked upon the casket were pillow from sister and brothers: wreath from Crawford United Church, basket of flowers from Mr. and Mrs. Will Livingstone and family of London, and others.
