As was seen in last week's Review, the death took place of Roger McEachern of Priceville, one of the pioneers of the South Line, Glenelg, coming there 73 years ago when a little boy. In giving a backward look, it reminds us of the passing of those who fought the hardships of pioneer life in the old Township of Glenelg, chopping and logging and afterwards followed by picking stones and putting them in order to make fences. The subject of our sketch experienced the double work by first clearing the timber of no value, afterwards gathering stones which are yet seen in piles here and there in the fields, and some into fences. The funeral on Wednesday, 8th June, was largely attended. A young man from college conducted the funeral service, speaking from the words "In my Father's house are many mansions," earnestly entreating all to make sure of being admitted, for there is room for all who seek admission, no matter to what denomination they belong in this life. Baptist Association Met in Chesley

The O. Sound Association of Baptist Churches, embracing all Baptist Churches in Grey and Bruce Counties, north of Hanover and Paisley, and west of Flesherton and Meaford, held their 40th annual meeting in the Chesley Baptist Church on June 10th. Rev. H. Crickington of the Chesley and North Glenelg Baptist Churches was the preacher of the annual sermon. Inspirational addresses were delivered by the Moderator, Rev. W. S. McAlpine of Warton, Rev. A. S. Parrall of Paisley and Rev. T. E. Richards of Hanover. The speakers from outside the Association were Prof. N. H. Parker of McMaster University representing Christian Education; Rev Dr McLaurin of Cataraugus representing Western Missions; Rev. Johnston Turnbull of Bolivia, who brought good tidings of our great work in that country; Rev. Dr. Webbot Toronto on S. S. work; Rev. E. A. Therrien of Montreal on the Grande Ligne Mission and Rev. H. E. Coumans of Toronto on 'Hoffe Missions. In an address on "The Millennial Sunday School", Mrs E. M. London of Chesley, stressed the importance of a thorough religious education, the establishment of an adequate system of records, public recognition for good work done and the vital importance of Teacher Training. Encouraging reports were given by the various churches, showing a substantial increase in Missionary contributions over the previous year.

Friday a. m., June 10, Deacon A. E. Pickard of Paisley led a conference on Deacon's Problems and Rev. L. H. Vall of Meaford on Pastor's Problems. At the same hour in the Auditorium of the church, the Women's Mission Circles of the Association, held their annual business session. Mrs Mason, Hanover, gave a helpful address on 'Our Circle Problems and how to solve them.' In the afternoon Miss Seiling presented the work of the Boye Are Polish Mission in Toronto in a way that gripped all hearts. Miss E. Priest who has spent 35 years as missionary in India, tenderly drew a vivid picture of her work there. Rev. E. A. Therrien told of the victories of the cross in Foller Institute, Grande Ligne, Quebec. A pleasing feature of the afternoon session was the presentation of the status of a Foreign Mission Life membership certificate to Mrs C. P. Day of Leith, who is retiring from the Directorship of the Circles after many years of efficient leadership.

The closing meeting of the Ass'n. was devoted to B.Y.P.U. work. Miss Weer, Hanover, gave a detailed report of the recent convention in Hamilton. Miss England, O. Sound, who had spent most of her life in India, delighted the audience with intimate pictures of the great benedicting mission of the past. Her experiences as a school teacher there, her visits to the arid brought the closing message, emphasizing the value of consecrated sacrificial service.

The following resolution was unanimously endorsed: "It is our conviction that the liquor traffic, whether under public or private control, is evil, and breeds poverty, misery and crime. We believe that prohibition is the only successful method of dealing with it. We regret the passing from the Statute Books of the O.T.A.—an Act that has been the source of very great benefit, socially and economically to this province. Believing this we urge our people to keep the goal of prohibition ever before them and by intelligent, persistent, educational propaganda, to hasten the day of its triumphant return.

Diamond Jubilee Medals

The Minister of Education for Ontario announces that for the year 1928, the Legislative grants will be apportioned in accordance with the regulations in force for 1927, no change having been made. All Teachers and School Boards will note that, as announced by the Minister of Education, the National Committee for the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation intends to distribute medals to all school pupils who take part in the public exercises on Dominion Day and the following days. Hence all Dominion Day Celebration Secretaries, School Boards, and Teachers should cooperate to secure the organized attendance and participation of all school pupils at these celebrations in order that every school pupil in South Grey may secure a commemorative Jubilee Medal which in the future will become a much prized family heirloom. All School Boards, (Public, Continuation and High,) should notify Inspector R. Wright, Hanover, at once, as to the number of medals required and to whom they should be sent, so that the pupils entitled may receive them in time.
