"During the past week the Advance Office has received scores of telegrams calling inquiring about the Entrance examination results, which have not come to hand. According to the Department of Education the results of the Entrance are supposed to be ready for publication by July 12th, and it is very seldom that the returns are received earlier than that date. The results in several centres in the Inspectorate of South Grey were announced in newspapers last week and it has made it hard for the students in close by centres to see the Inspectorate to wait a longer time for the results. We believe that those centres were the only ones in the province to receive their returns last week, while the remainder will be given in the newspapers this week. It would be better if the Inspector in South Grey were not in such a hurry to publish reports when it is not necessary according to the Department of Education." — Flesherston Advance.

AIDING TEMPERANCE!

Holders of permits can secure half a keg or 16 gallons of beer when a sale in some 36 hours it will thus be seen the half keg orders are meant to be laced up in a big booze jamboree in the interests of temperance as the promoters of the present system explained it would work out. There were 568

convictions in Toronto police courts for violations of the new liquor control act during the first month of its operation. What a fine temperance measure it has proven to be! STANDING OF PARTIES IN FEDERAL HOUSE

Within a few days the writs will be issued for the bye-elections in North Huron. The polling date will be in August, near the six months' limit in which a bye election must be held. The recent bye election in Carleton Place, N. B. when A. R. Foster, a Liberal, was elected by acclamation, in place of the late Hon. J. K. Fleming, has changed slightly the standing of the parties. The Government side is now just 50 per cent of the House without counting Liberal Progressives or Independents, who usually support it. The division is calculated as follows: Liberals 122; Conservatives 89; Progressives 7; U.F.A. 11; Liberal Progressives 10; Labor 3; Independents 2; vacant 1; Total 245.

POSSIBLY 6 CANDIDATES WILL RUN IN N. HURON

The bye-election date in North Huron will be about Aug. 22. Information obtainable points to a potential field of six candidates. The Liberals have nominated Archibald Hislop, ex-M. P. The Progressive candidate is Sheldon Bricker, while T. G. Allen of Dungannon has announced himself as Independent and Abner Cosens of Wingham has also been credited with intention to run. Conservatives are reported to be divided between H. J. A. McEwan, mayor of Goderich, their candidate last year and Geo. M. Spotton, candidate in 1925. For the Government side, Hon. J. C. Elliott was in Goderich and Hon. James Malcolm is also in the district.

CIVIC WELCOMES

The Council of Lucknow have erected signboards on the roads leading into the village. On the one side the traveller entering sees these words, "You are in Luck-

now drive canny." On leaving the village this is what one sees, "Always welcome to our Sepoy town." Who will be the first of our councilmen to advocate and stress for action in getting appropriate welcome erected on highways leading into Durham? Even a simple "DURHAM WELCOMES YOU" would awaken kindly feelings and a "GOOD BYE, CALL AGAIN" on the other side, would have the same effect. Let's have it.

CAN HE REPEAT?

Everywhere in the automobile world unusual attention is being paid to the endeavor that Henry Ford is going to make during the coming fall season to re-establish himself as a leader in the industry with a new type of car. It has been intimated that he has set aside an appropriation of as high as \$15,000,000 to advertise the new motor he will put on the market.

Leaders in other companies, however, are very skeptical as to his ability to again be anything like the factor in the field that he was some years ago when the old Ford was in demand all over the world. They reason that unless he has something entirely different from any other standard car he will simply have to meet the competition of a number of other manufacturers who have already found it possible to market their output of cars. On this account he will be facing an entirely different set of conditions than those which prevailed when the old "Ford" was a by-word in every section of the country, where people wanted to own some sort of car or another. The United States market, however, has always shown itself most responsive to advertising and \$15,000,000 may be the means of converting many people to the attractiveness of the new type that the Ford engineers have been working on.—Financial Times.
