

Mackinac Trip Very Enjoyable

Newspaper people are only human and can enjoy a holiday or jaunt as well as the best.

The "Review" was represented on a water trip on the "S.S. Manitoulin" last week which takes in many points of interest that get little publicity in general.

Georgian Bay waters are beautiful and the many side water trips from Owen Sound to various points on the eastern or northern shore can show the Ontario tourist that there is no need to go far afield to revel in all the essentials of a good holiday.

Leaving Owen Sound Monday at 11 p.m., we awoke early Tuesday to view Killarney on the north shore of Manitoulin and as far removed from modern strife and chaos as it is possible.

From here we strike a little south-west for Manitoulin Island. The residents of the island—about 100 miles in length—are thrifty and industrious and already are importing sheep, for which the island lends itself well as pasture land.

The return trip was also made in beautiful weather. At Sault Ste Marie two young ladies, Misses A. Hamilton of Meaford and L. Leyton of Nova Scotia, in hikers' costume, became passengers and their holiday had been a most unusual one.

The crew of the "Manitoulin" were courteous to a man and nothing was spared to make the trip as enjoyable as lay in their power.

dustries of the Island are put to good use. Gore Bay is the important centre of Manitoulin but the majority of the party were not privileged to "do" the town as for some hours previous to entering, a high wind struck the "Manitoulin" broadside, which had the effect of sending many of her passengers to bed and for a time one questioned their further existence rather than the future possibilities of Gore Bay and its people.

By Wednesday noon we alighted at Sault Ste Marie and were taken in charge by Mr and Mrs Neil Sinclair who kindly conveyed us to points of interest in that bustling city. It boasts of a population of 22,000 and while we didn't see all of these in the short time there, we felt convinced that all that were worth while had the "once over."

The trip from here was along St. Mary's River up to Mackinac Island in United States territory. This perhaps had the scenic beauty of the trip and from 3 to 10 p.m. the eye took in historic points of interest, such as the early missionary endeavors of the Jesuit fathers as well as the strategic points in the war of 1812-1814 in this section of the conflict.

Mackinac Island itself is a beauty spot, kept up by the State of Michigan and a tourist centre that varies from 4000 people in the summer months to 400 in winter period. When France yielded her Canadian possessions to England in 1760, the fort was occupied by British troops; and then in 1763 occurred the massacre of the garrison of Fort Michilimackinac, an incident of the conspiracy of Chief Pontiac of the Ottawa tribes.

In 1780 the military post was transferred to Mackinac Island, as affording a more defensible position and the present fortification begun. The fort had no share in the Revolutionary War. At its close it came by cession into control of the U. States.

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THE ROLL CALL REV. J. E. SMITH Rev. J. E. Smith, representative of the British and Foreign Bible Society, Saskatoon branch, passed away suddenly at his home at Regina, his death being due to heart disease. For the past 31 years, Rev. Mr. Smith had been engaged in the active ministry of the Presbyterian Church, both in Eastern and Western Canada. A native of Durham, he entered Queen's University in 1889 graduating in 1893, after which he attended Manitoba Theological College. Mr Smith held pastorates covering a period of more than seven years in each case in First Essa Church, Cookstown, Ont. and latterly in the combined church of Burnbrae and Ryeston, at Campbellford, Ont. Going West in 1912, he held a pastorate at Morse, Sask., followed by four years' service on the Mistawasis Indian Reserve, near Prince Albert, Sask. In 1918, coming to Saskatoon, Rev. Mr Smith joined the British and Foreign Bible Society, with which organization he was associated till his recent death. Rev. Mr Smith is survived by his widow and three sons: Cairns, his tutor master at Scott Collegiate Institute, Regina; Grant, University of Washington, Seattle; Gordon, a student at Scott Collegiate.
