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Glenelg Council

Met on Aug. 6th, members all present, receive in chair, minutes read and adopted.

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A petition was presented by ratepayers asking for a special grant for gravelling Hall's sideroad. After discussing this question Council decided to take no action for the present.

Whitmore-McKechnie: That the following claims for sheep killed and injured as certified by sheep inspectors be paid: Geo Morwood, 4 sheep and 3 lambs killed \$66; Sylvester Martin, 1 sheep and 2 lambs killed, \$28; Thos Glenecross, 3 lambs killed, \$30; Hugh McArthur, 1 sheep killed, \$10; Alex Carson, 2 lambs killed, \$20; Frank Haley, 2 lambs killed \$21; H. Watson, 1 lamb killed \$9; Chas. Connor, 2 sheep killed \$20; Mercer, 2 sheep and 1 lamb killed, 1 sheep injured, \$115. Carried.

Whitmore-McKechnie: That sheep inspectors be paid for services as follows: Malcolm McInnis, 5 inspections \$7.50; S. H. Wright, 7 inspections \$10.50. Carried.

Weplett-Black: That the Clerk be instructed to notify the owners of a dog or dogs, which are known to have been killing sheep in this township of their liability under the Sheep Protection Act of 1925 and to respectfully demand recompense to the Township of Glenelg for all payments made by this Council to parties suffering loss by destruction or injury to sheep by said dogs. Carried.

Weplett-Black: That the following accounts be paid: Durham Chronicle, printing Treas. Statements, Auditors' Reports form Oct-1, 1926, \$140.50; Municipal World Ltd., Collectors Roll \$572. Carried.

Weplett-Black: That this Council authorize the Town's road superintendent to spend the amount of \$50 on Townline between Glenelg and Eremont, providing Eg't spends a like sum. Carried.

Weplett-Black: That the Township Rate be 65-10 mills on the dollar for 1927. Carried.

Weplett-Black: That the Clerk be instructed to prepare a by-law, authorizing the addition of 5 per cent to all taxes remaining unpaid after the 20th day of December in each year until this by-law is repealed and further that taxes be collected through the following banks: Standard Bank at Durham and Priceville; Royal Bank at Markdale. Carried.

McKechnie-Whitmore: In amendment, that the Clerk be instructed to prepare a by-law adding 1 per cent after Jan. 31st on all taxes remaining unpaid after said dates. Lost.
