A MILLION IN A WEEK
The C. N. E., or the Toronto Fair, will this year apparently make a record as the end of the first week showed an attendance of over a million, and good weather this week is still boosting the figures.

Of course the big swim and the opening of the Prince's Gate by the Prince of Wales were features that swelled the attendance on two days, but even beyond this, the increasing number of the Show itself is tending to draw large numbers from the United States, year after year, and this year as never before from Northern Ontario. This last invasion came in a body, meant, no doubt, to impress Old Ontario, especially Ontario legislators, that they are an important entity, deserving of consideration, and who can blame them. We can not even attempt to describe the Fair. One day is all insufficient for that purpose. Flowers and Fruit, Music and Machinery, Art and Automobiles, Farm Stock, etc. all superabundant. New buildings are being added yearly and we were particularly impressed with the Ontario Building, where about 15 counties, side by side, Grey Co. amongst them, present their products in artistic display. This is only one feature and visitors should not miss this building.

Toronto Anglo Saxondom got a chill over the big swim. That their own Geo. Young was beaten by the German, Vierkoetter, who was first and by Michel, a Frenchman, who came second with Young out of it at the 5th mile, was a hard blow. But the crowds were good sports and cheered the winner lustily. Vierkoetter swam the 21 miles in less than 12 hours, others took over 15 hours. Vierkoetter was sound asleep in bed before next beat had got to the winning mark. He is spoken of as being a modest, gentlemanly fellow. He is 26 years old.
The C. N. E. authorities say no more long swimming matches in future. May stage a course half of 21 miles.

Press Day, Sept. 2nd, again furnished opportunity for meeting old friends. The assembled brethren were addressed by Prof. Tilley, a member of New Brunswick government and a son of Sir Leonard Tilley, one of the Fathers of Confederation. Also by Bruce Bairnsfather, the originator of "Ole Bill," one of the finest of war time picture humor. Wednesday's papers report attendance up to Tuesday night as being 1,382,000.
