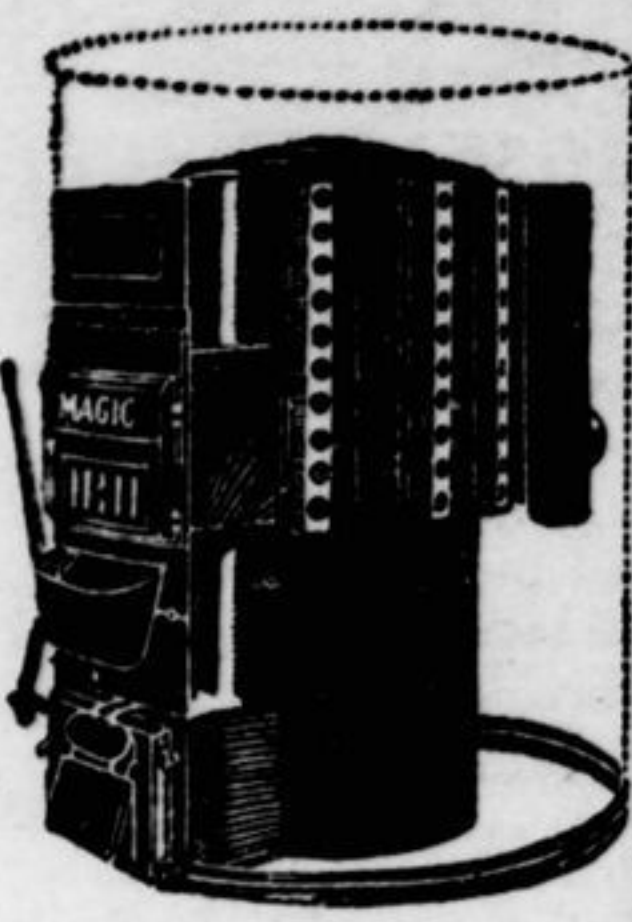

Canada has had three "Wests" in her History

Stirring address given to Presbytery on Western needs by Dr. Oliver of St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon

The Presbytery of Grey of the United Church of Canada, which met at Division St. Church, Owen Sound, on Sept. 29th, listened to an address by Rev. E. H. Oliver, M.A., Ph. D., principal of St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon and one of the leaders of the church in Western Canada.

Dr. Oliver stressed the fact that the cross was in the Roman world, the galleys, and that before Christ died upon it He bore the galleys in His own heart. As His followers, the Church and the believer must also bear the galleys in his heart.

The Modern West was characterized more by settlement, especially of British stock, the folks from Ontario and farther East, from the U.S. and from the British Isles. During this period, Missions were established among the settlers, and towns were beginning and developing.

The development of the country was rapid and romantic and today we have to face the results of that growth. Population, agriculture, and wealth and social life have increased and that increase has brought the problems of today.
