Coal Furnaces to be Installed in Hall

Council have warm Discussion over This Question Monday Night

The new heating system to be installed in the Town Hall, was the burning controversial question before the Durham Town Council Monday evening. The Property Com., not wishing to take the responsibility of deciding between coal or wood furnaces, brought it before the whole Council on the subject. Nine schools on the matter. Chairman C. S. Hunter stated tenders had been called for wood-burning furnaces. Two tenders came in, one for \$465 which would heat 35,000 cu. feet and another \$565, heating 65,000 cu. feet. He had been advised by a prominent consulting engineer of experience, that wood would be most suitable fuel to use for hall heating, when an occasional fire only was required.

Reeve Bell thought nothing but coal furnaces the thing and wood could be used in them in milder fall and spring weather. Wood was becoming increasingly difficult to get, and before the probable life of the furnaces—25 years had expired, wood would possibly be unobtainable. The Council was divided in deciding on a motion by Bell—Ab. Noble, that Council instruct the Property Com. to call for tenders for coal furnaces to heat hall, it carried by a 4-3 vote. \$1625.79 was passed in Finance Com. act's, \$500 of it going to Sinking Fund to meet maturing debentures.

Ab. Noble—R. McLean—That a street light be placed on Garafra St. between R. Barber's and Hodgson's homes. Car.

A largely signed petition by Upper Town residents requested a street light in front of Mr. C. Kennedy's house. It is a dark locality and other lights being largely hidden by thick foliage. The Fire & Light Com. will investigate and see if feasible to remove present lights to better location or install a new light, and bring in a report at next meeting.

A boys' Club asked use of the old Library as a club room and gymnasium. The meeting was held in the Public Library, Sec'y Elvin in form of the Council it was under Library Board jurisdiction and rented to Hydrant Com.

Mr. Wm Laidlaw addressed the Council, asking while renovating the Town Hall, they build two small cells under same for accommodation of prisoners. No action was taken.

Chairman Hunter of Property Com. was advised however, to have all it, and besides the furnaces, use would readily be found for remaining space in basement.

On motion of Noble—McLean, T. Whitmore and Harry Holmes, each paid \$3 for 12 hrs work from midnight to noon guarding the McGowan fire.
