Deer and Moose

The Ottawa Government has announced a change in the open season for deer and moose this year, in that either animal may be taken in the district south of the French and Mattawa Rivers from Nov. 1st to Nov. 30th, and in the district north of the French and Mattawa from Oct. 19th to Nov. 30th. These periods are very much in favor of the hunter, especially if the weather may turn cold and it is trusted the action of the Government will result in a marked increase in the number of those taking to the woods.
