We have just completed our 50th anniversary of being a correspondent to the Review and we cannot promise to contribute for 50 years more. Its tho' as it were a special favor from the Author of all good that we were permitted to see the anniversary of our long experience as writer to the Review which was first called the 'Gray Review' when it started in Dundalk.

The many changes since 50 years ago cannot be numbered. The then babe in the cradle is now more on the decline than otherwise. Those in the promise of life 50 years ago are now few and far between.
