THE GREAT CONFERENCE

AT OTTAWA

This week the Premiers of all the Provinces of the Dominion and other representatives are in conference with the Dominion authorities at Ottawa. The object is to have a heart to heart talk of things concerning the welfare of all the Provinces, especially as they are related to the Dominion.

As might be expected in such a far-flung country, differences as to many things are revealed in the discussions. The eastern provinces for instance want a larger subsidy from the Dominion treasury and it seems certain that Prince Edward Island at least will be granted this boon. The Western provinces are desirous of getting control of their own natural resources Ontario and Quebec have much in common, though differing in the main on developing St. Lawrence navigation.

This is a Conference, not a law-making body and so far they appear to be working harmoniously. Hon. Jas. Robb, Dominion Treasurer, "sits tight," meanwhile and his attitude will be "show me" before any hauls are made from the big chest.

BUY MADE-IN-CANADA CHRISTMAS GIFTS

Application of the Produced in Canada principle to the purchase of Christmas gifts is being urged on all its members by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. A special card is being prepared for early distribution directing the attention of the 4,200 members of the organization to the desirability of purchasing articles produced in Canada for gifts, instead of imported articles and suggesting that this policy be recommended to all employers of Canadian employees and their families.

Martin Lauder Attempting

Biggest Hockey Jump Ever

From Junior amateur with Owen Sound to Senior Professional with Boston, is the jump a Durham lad, Martin Lauder has made, and if he makes good, he will be the only player in history to make the grade in one season. This is how a Boston daily tells it:

"Martin Lauder, who will play centre ice for the Cubs against the Bruins in the first hockey practice scrimmage of the season Sunday is trying a remarkable stunt, one which, if he puts it across, will make him famous in the history of the ice game. This 20-year old youth is attempting to make the jump from junior grade amateur hockey to the major league in a single season and if one is willing to believe Art Ross, manager of the Bruins, the kid has more than an even chance."

Rated best amateur player. Lauder is small, as hockey players go. He is not much more than 5 feet 6 or 7 inches, and looking wet would not tip the beam at much more than 157 pounds, but there is a veritable dynamo of action that gets working within him when he steps onto the surface.

Ross was on the trail of Lauder quite early in the game. Playing with the Owen Sound Juniors, winners of the Junior Allen cup, he attracted attention from hockey scouts the length and breadth of the Dominion.

Dunc Munro of the Montreal Maroons, who is just a year or two out of the amateur game himself and knows considerable about the situation in Canada, in conversation with Ross some time ago in Montreal, spoke in the highest terms about Lauder, declaring him to be the finest amateur prospect within the confines of the country. He did so only because he thought that Lauder would never turn pro, having refused several offers.

Won Allen Cup Alone

Imagine Munro's surprise when Ross flashed Lauder's contract on the Maroon. Art had not been asleep at the switch and Munro congratulated the Bruin mentor at obtaining the signature.

The story of Howie Morenz who made the jump from the Stratford intermediates to Les Canadiens and stardom has often been told, but this jump which Lauder is trying to make puts that one in the shade. There is every reason to believe that he can make the grade, for he has the spirit that makes champions as was illustrated in the last Allen cup series in which he, single handed, produced the winning tallies for his club.

In the first game of the finals, he missed five shots at the net and the opposing team captured the game 4-1. In the second game, however, he smashed three into the net, passed for the fourth and as the opponents were kept scoreless, won the series with a single shot to spare.

VACCINATION BEST SAFEGUARD

Great progress has been made in the way of prevention of a number of diseases that were formerly very formidable, yet there are people that refuse to take the precautions that medical scientists offer. Proof is overwhelming that vaccination is a most effective safeguard. Two or three years ago there was a serious outbreak of small pox in which Windsor and the Border Towns were involved. In these cases there were 67 cases, all traceable to a single overlooked case, and 32 persons died quickly, or a death rate of 71 per cent. Ten cases occurred in persons who had been vaccinated successfully 12 to 65 years before. Of these none died. There were 73 cases of persons successfully vaccinated while the disease was developing. Of these none died. The entire death rate came from the unvaccinated.
