Armistice Day Observed in Durham

Also Lights Switched on in front of Monument for first time.

The grim realities and results of the Great War were brought home to a large body of people Friday evening last around our soldiers' monument, when a memorial service was held out of respect to fallen and departed comrades. These young men gave of the 'sweet red wine of youth' that the glorious heritage which we enjoyed might be preserved.

The Town Council, in conjunction with the local Hydro Association, ar ected two steel poles with bulbs surmounting them, in front of the monument and for the first time that evening they were connected with the current. Mrs E. L. Knight (Margaret Munro), whose husband fell in the great struggle, pressed switch which illumined the mounument and surrounding territory.

Mayor Murdock introduced the occasion and asked Rev. B. D. Armstrong, an ex-service man, to cone forward and act as chairman of ce emonies.
