What has become of them—where is their glory? Off from the barracks and trenches abode? Some still remember the thrill of their story. And some are but dust by the side of the road.

## Hydro Poles Levelled near Orchard

Last Friday night and Saturday, saw one of the most violent wind storms of the year, of such velocity that eight hydro poles along the Garraux at Orchard were blown down. Mr. J. S. Culp, Traffic Officer on the Prov'l Highway, had left Mount Forest after dinner Saturday and was travelling north on his motor cycle when he saw a large pole topple over ahead of him quickly followed by seven others. He was fortunate in not arriving a few seconds sooner, when he might have been struck by one of the falling poles, which snapped off near the bottom. Running into the nearest phone, he called up Durham Hydro Station and had the current shut off on Holstein switch. Eugenia was notified and in an hour or so a gang of men had arrived who cleared away the debris, and placed temporary power lines until new permanent poles were erected a day or two later. The road was cleared by 7 p.m. but for the afternoon, Officer Culp closed the highway to traffic for a block and made a detour via 2nd and Egremont. In Durham the only damage we learned of was the smoke stack of the Clark Metals factory being blown over. A few trees were also laid flat but no further serious damage is reported.

## Mt. Forest Produce Dealer Fined \$50 and Costs

The concluding cases for infringement of the Egg Grading Act were three charges against Mr. Dietrich, produce dealer of Mt. Forest, and were tried before Magistrate Laflin on Friday morning. Two charges were for purchasing eggs straight, instead of on a graded basis, from R. J. Arnill, Holstein merchant, about Aug. 30th and Sept. 17th last, and the third, a similar charge for purchasing from Chas. Drumm, another Holstein merchant. Inspector Morrison, the two merchants and the defendant were the witnesses. Mr. Morrison, whose counsel was Barrister Kilgour of Mt. Forest, gave evidence that the merchants could not produce the grading slips given for these purchases, and that he had searched defendant's books, and could find no duplicate for these transactions. Mr. Arnill said he had received slips, but they were not kept. Defendant stated he paid an advance at the price of firsts when lifting eggs, and made adjustment necessary on next trip. Both merchants said they received, or paid out balance after grading had been done, but had no books or records to show it.

The Magistrate found Dietrich guilty on first two charges of purchases from Arnill, and imposed the minimum fine of \$25 and costs for each, but dismissed the case re the purchase from Drumm.

Dietrich's counsel, Mr. J. B. Moon, of Mount Forest, stated he would appeal the decision.

## Armistice Day Observed in Durham

Also Lights Switched on in front of Monument for first time.

I. O. D. E. Arrange Service

The grim realities and results of the Great War were brought home to a large body of people Friday evening last around our soldiers' monument, when a memorial service was held out of respect to fallen and departed comrades. These young men gave of the sweet red wine of youth that the glorious heritage which we enjoyed might be preserved.

The Town Council, in conjunction with the local Hydro Association, erected two steel poles with bulbs encircling them, in front of the monument and for the first time that evening they were connected with the current. Mrs. E. L. Knight (Margaret Munro), whose husband fell in the great struggle, pressed the switch which illumined the monument and surrounding territory.

Mayor Murdoch introduced the occasion and asked Rev. B. D. Armstrong, an ex-service man, to come forward and act as chairman of ceremonies. This was done and the assemblage sang "O God, our help in ages past." This was followed by a prayer by Rev. W. H. Smith and the address of the evening by Rev. H. S. Fiddis. Rev. Mr. Hayes of Trinity Church, was selected for this honor, but as he was called out of town, that afternoon, Rev. Mr. Fiddis kindly consented to fill the vacancy.

He stated that he was somewhat under a handicap, not knowing personally many of the names on the roll of honor. As the basis of his remarks he chose that familiar Biblical phrase "He being dead yet speaketh." Life, Mr. Fiddis said, was not measured by years. Some people in a short period of time, exert untold influence, while others in a life long in years, may accomplish little. We were gathered here to ponder over the deeds and actions of those gone, yet still breathing messages of bravery, unselfishness and valor. Freedom was endangered, right trampled upon, and to guard these virtues, they went forth with a great purpose. This dearly bought freedom was not ours to be regarded lightly. It was the spirit of sacrifice and the speaker made it vividly clear that it was in line with the great supreme sacrifice of Christ himself and it was obligatory on our part to take up this spirit.

Rev. Father McGoey was also called upon but was not present. The placing of wreaths was next in order and as well as several private contributions, the ex-service men, Red Cross Society and I.O.D.E. had beautiful mementoes.

## Ex Service Men Remember Fallen Comrades

Meet at Mahn House Friday Night and live in the past

On Armistice night, Friday, Nov. 11th forty five ex-service men from town and surrounding district gathered in the dining room of the Mahn Hotel where a chicken dinner had been provided for them by Mr. Hahn and staff and which was in every way a tribute to the cuisine of that hotel.

However it was more than a banquet and the spirit pervading the gathering was back in the fields of Flanders with their fallen comrades, and it was rather the sense of loss they had suffered in their passing, that brought them together this night. They had paid the supreme sacrifice for their country and to-day the country is the richer for it.

Dr. A. M. Bell was toastmaster of the evening and two toasts were given and responded to: "King and 'Our Fallen Comrades.'" For the former toast, the National Anthem was loyally sung and Mr. C. H. Darling speaking to it. Rev. B. D. Armstrong and J. A. Rowland spoke to the latter toast.

Discussion also took place after the banquet as to forming something along the line of a local club in affiliation with the Legion of Empire or other soldiers' organization that would enable the 'men' to be called together on short notice if necessary to discuss topics of interest to them. A committee comprising John Steadman, Rev. Armstrong, Mack Saunders, Jas. Duffield and Dr. A. M. Bell, was appointed and have power to call a meeting whenever necessary.

There were also a few impromptu speeches, from John Clark, Arch. King, Mack Saunders and J. L. S'adman. The former two were the only two ex-service men present who belonged to the Imperial Army.

Community singing and a free and informal time closed the evening.
