Here and There

To meet the increased activity in aviation the Royal Canadian Air Force will be equipped with 25 new planes, according to information given out at Ottawa recently. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has decided to give the name of Princess Elaine to the new vessel building in Scotland for the Vancouver-Nanaimo route, at a cost of \$1,500,000.

An exceptional crop of blueberries has been gathered this season, according to the agent of the Canadian Pacific Express Company at Kenora, 324,767 pounds having passed through his office to date, and approximately 30,000 pounds being shipped over the lakes to the United States. The estimated value of the total shipment is placed at about \$38,000.

The names of Nungesser and Coli, who sought to fly the Atlantic but failed, will live forever in the place names of Canada. The topographical survey, department of the Interior, has issued a new map of the world bearing areas in the vicinity of Woman Narrows and Birch Lakes in northwestern Ontario. The names of these two aviators from France have been given to two lakes.

E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has announced in a telegram to H. R. Silver, president of the Lord Nelson Hotel Co., at Hamilton, that the railway company has decided to subscribe to the extent of \$350,000 in financing the hotel. Construction of a \$1,250,000 hotel building will commence immediately.
