U. F. O. CONVENTION

The Annual Convention of this body was held last week and though it was revealed that there was a decreasing membership, the meeting functioned as usual showing signs of life not accorded to it in some quarters and which more pep can be injected than in both Liberal and Conservative ranks.

The resolution relating to Mr. E. A. Drury's action in the North Huron bye-election was the piece-de-resistance. This resolution as drawn up, was bitter in its reference to Mr. Drury but it was soon found that Mr. Drury had sympathizers and after discussion the clauses with the sting in them were withdrawn and the resolution passed.

The charges made by an M.P. named Hepburn down Sarnia way, that a clique existed, with Mr. Morrison at its head, which was a kind of "family compact" also had a hearing. It was alleged that a cousin, a son and nephew were all getting emoluments at head office, amounting to about \$20,000, the implication being that nepotism was injurious to the public good.

The charges were not sustained and Sec'y Morrison was abundantly vindicated.

Miss MacPhail was in the limelight and of course championed Mr. Morrison and showed animosity to Mr. Drury and not ashamed to show it. Mr. Drury, though much criticized still retains the good will and respect of a large portion of the membership.

WILD STORM ON THE LAKES

Winter storms on the lakes last week were more than usually violent and in a few cases lives were lost. In many cases lives were in imminent danger and much suffering resulted from stalled and storm-driven ships. Some rescues were made in a spirit of heroism, admirable in itself and invaluable to the human lives snatched from gravest danger. Who can estimate the weary hours spent on a breaking-up barge, in zero weather, wind-lashed spray, helpless till help arrived, but it did arrive, in them were withdrawn and the resolution passed.

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Parliament Meets Jan. 26th

The announcement has been made that the next session at Ottawa will begin on Jan. 26th. With over a month to spare, one may be allowed to hope that an agenda will be ready to present to the members, and not as too often happens, weeks being spent in practical idleness. Much interest will be taken in this session, the first under Bennett's opposition leadership. Everyone will hope that opposition criticism will be constructive in its nature and not simply partisan.

"SIGHT UNSEEN"

At school, when a boy wishes to get rid of a jack knife with a broken blade or a cracked handle, he will offer to trade knives with another "sight unseen." It becomes a battle of wits to see which can take the other in the worst. Long ago, Rounal merchants displayed signs, saying "Let the buyer beware." Responsibility rested on the purchaser, not on the seller.

The degree to which business is based upon confidence in the integrity of the dealers has recently been revealed in a striking way. A manufacturer of low priced motor cars whose name it is quite unnecessary to mention—announced that he intended to put out a new model. He did not state the price nor describe the details. Yet four hundred thousand people placed orders "sight unseen." A hundred and twenty-five thousand people paid down deposits in order to be sure of an early delivery of cars. These purchasers had perfect trust in the honesty of the manufacturer. They were ready to buy his car on faith months before the factories started production. This is surely a high-water mark of business confidence. A few more such examples as this and all debate as to honesty being the best policy may be considered closed.

Medical Case Withdrawn

Dr. McDonald Exonerated by the Parents of Victim

No little interest has been aroused in Durham and vicinity of late over a charge of malpractice brought against Dr. W. J. McDonald of St. Catharines, who practiced with Dr. D. Jamieson a number of years ago. The operation took place in May and the 13 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. McDonald, the charge being that the doctor had been careless in that while sewing up the wound he had not removed a sponge. At the trial, the judge pointed out that a surgical sponge was quite unlike the usual commercial article; it is a small square thing meant to absorb blood in the wound and quite readily overlooked. However, it was proved to the satisfaction of the parents, that the doctor had missed the sponge, asked the nurse to look for it and was in no way criminally careless, the little girl being now well.

The upshot of the trial is that the parents have acknowledged their mistake, had found out certain facts, and the doctor had not been blamed for the acts complained of in the action. They willingly withdrew all charges of malpractice and drew all charges of malpractice and reputation of the doctor as a skilful medical surgeon enhanced thereby rather than injured. The judge expressed his delight in the following terms: "I must say that when I saw the case on the list I was much surprised, knowing as I did Dr. McDonald's high reputation as a surgeon. It is true that even 'the great Homer sometimes nods'. And it might have been that some carelessness had taken place, but it led me to scrutinize the evidence very carefully because it was a shock to me to think that if circumstances arise, such as the collapse of the patient on the table or something of that kind, in a serious operation, the courts will not readily impute negligence when the patient's life is at stake."

Dr. McDonald's many friends here will rejoice that he has been so completely vindicated.


