DEATH OF GEORGE WRIGHT

One of the best known men in Proton, George Wright, was born in Haldon Co. on Nov. 15, 1854 and died at his home here, Dec. 5, 1927, aged 74 years. He was buried on Dec. 7 in the family plot in Salem cemetery. Rev. Mr McCormack, his pastor, conducting services at house and grave. In charge of funeral, the pall bearers were six old neighbors, Neil McMillan, Geo. Black, Jno. McNaulty, W. A. Richardson, Jno. and Wm. Haw. A large gathering of friends and neighbors gave testimony of respect for deceased and sympathy for bereaved family. Premonition was the immediate cause of death but deceased had been falling of late. Those left to mourn are Mrs Wright and two daughters, Annie (Mrs Selwyn McLean, Honeywood) and Mary (Mrs Sam Coutts) of Sack, and five sons, John and Andrew on nearby farms; Howard, in Fiesherston; Edward in Priceville; and Wilfrid at home. There was also a sister, Mrs. McAnlay, Fiesherston. Geo. Wright came to Proton 47 years ago and bought lot 17 con 17. In 1885 he was married to Bella Dow of this place and they together built a home of which the family have reason to be proud. Mr Wright was very ambitious and energetic and is well remembered by the men of his age as a leader in all work—at the logging bees or barn raisings. In Swamp College school section he will be greatly missed as in the past 45 years, we think he has attended every annual meeting, served many terms on the board and for the last 20 years been Sec'y Treasurer. In 1897 he was elected councillor in the township, which office he held for the following 8 years. Then he retired for a few years and was again in for some time, in the years 1920-21 and '22 being Reeve, but always following up the workings of the council. Thus for 25 years he was in public life, often criticized but never cast down or discouraged. In public life as in private, he considered nothing a trouble if he could help on the good work for the people he represented. While the community will mourn the loss of Geo. Wright, we can all say we are glad that we knew him. Mrs Wright and family will have sweet remembrances of a husband and father who was anxious at all times for the welfare of his country. In politics, Mr Wright was Liberal until the UFO came into being a few years ago and with the farmers he cast his lot enthusiastically.

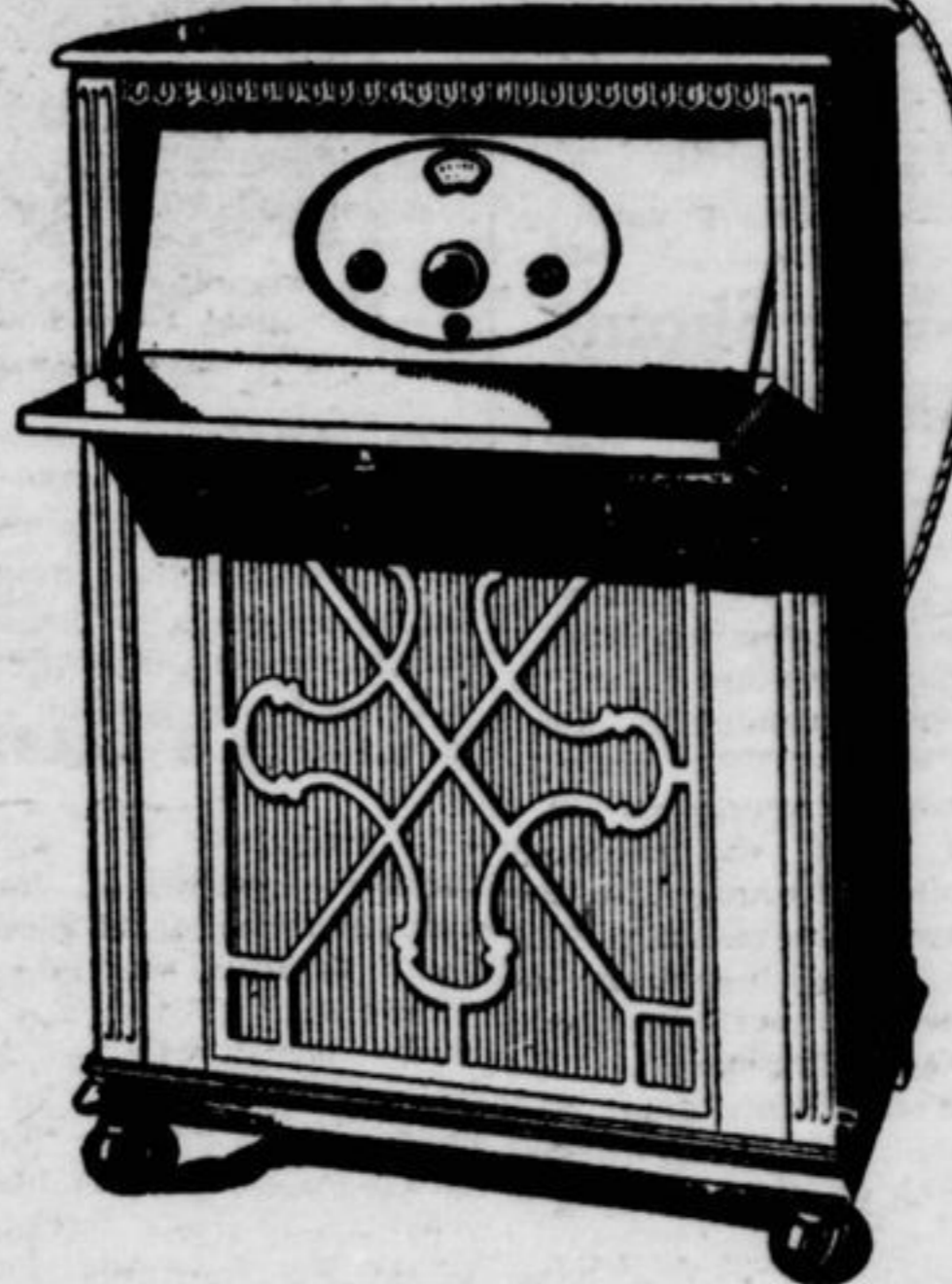
