REV. W. H. SMITH

And two thirds of that world are still waiting for the good news which bring peace and good will. May the love of Christ constrain us to do greater things, to win all the lost back again to the family of Our Father.

Amid the joy and bustle of the Christmas season, we are in danger of letting its true meaning pass un-noticed and permit a false conception of the day prevail in modern life. Like so much else in our day, Christmas is in danger of becoming commercialized. Already we have "The Christmas Trade" as a term in the business world and the "Christmas Presents" advertisement is quite prominent, and we have heard of "Christmas Rates" offered as inducements to utilize our transportation facilities.

All these things, that are with us and will likely continue to appear year by year, make it more necessary to sound clearly the real message of Christmas. Why do we make the day we celebrate the birth of the Saviour so important, that for weeks before we prepare for its advent? Consciously or unconsciously we recognize that in Jesus of Nazareth a new beginning commenced in human history.
