Statements, ballots, nomination notices and advertising \$75.50; Municipal World, Ltd. election supplies \$8.12; H. H. McDonald, minutes for publication for 1927 \$10; W. J. Ritchie, preparing Fin. Statement \$10; Wm Weir, assisting with same, \$8; Toronto Hospital for Sick Children, grant, \$10.

Whitmore — Black: That payment Voucher No 1 for road improvements as certified to by Tp. Road Supt. be accepted and payments made, amounting to \$41.90. Car.

Black — Boyd: That the Treasurer be authorized to accept from Wm. Weir, the sum of \$29.17 for sale of lands in Priceville Police Village. Car.

McKechnie — Black: That this Council accept report of Township Road Supt. under the provisions of the Highway Improvement Act for year ending Dec. 31st 1927, and that the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign petition for statutory grant on expenditure of \$359.62. Carried.

Whitmore — Black: That this Council advertise for Assessor for 1928. Carried.

McKechnie — Black: That in accordance with Section No. 121 of the Liquor Control Act of Ontario, this Council appoint Mr George Black as Constable for the Tp. of Glenelg at the rate of 30 cts. per hour for work performed and 10c per mile mileage as provided by law, and that Clerk be instructed to prepare a By-law confirming appointment. Carried.

Whitmore — McKechnie: That this Council offer a reward of \$20 to any person killing a wolf or bob-cat in the Township of Glenelg, satisfactory proof being first required by Council Board of such killing. Carried.

McKechnie — Boyd: That the dates of Council meetings for 1928 be as follows: Jan. 8th, Feb. 11th, April 7th, May 5th, June 2nd, July 7th, Aug. 4th, Sept. 1st, Oct. 6th, Nov. 10th, Dec. 15th. Carried.

McKechnie — Whitmore: That the printing year end on March 1st, and that the Durham Review be awarded printing from March 1st next. Car.

Black — McKechnie: That G. Whitmore be appointed with the auditors to examine the Treasurer's securities Carried.
