Jury Case in Division Court

to town next day but Mr Noble had come to Toronto. He saw Mrs Noble, but she refused to take the money and when that gentleman considered the \$20 was earnest money paid on the cattle. This was Murdoch's story.

Evidence was given in rebuttal that weakened this evidence. Mr. Noble was sure he had bought them, the defendant had "wished him luck" with his purchase. Later, the letter was produced that the \$20 was mailed in. Evidence was given that Murdoch had said he could not sleep at night because he sold too cheap. Noble said he it was who picked the bill up, not Murdoch, and on other points the evidence differed.

Mrs Noble released the interview she had with Mr Murdoch, Mr Geo. Ryan and Mr Jno. Grierson gave evidence strengthening Noble's plea. Mr H. Herd, a brother-in-law, testi-

fied that he had advised both parties to avoid law.

Mrs. Murdoch gave evidence corroborating her husband's story. Mr. Klein and Mr Henry both charged the jury, both with marked ability, setting forth strong and weak points in the evidence as they saw it. The Judge followed in an address to the Jury, setting forth the law of evidence and the procedure to be followed by impartial men.

Verdict for Noble, Plaintiff. After being out for half an hour, the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff allowing him a sum of \$128.74. The Judge thanked them in the name of the County and himself for their verdict to which he added a counsel fee of \$20.

EGREMONT CREAMERY CO. VS. H. G. MOORE AND CO.

This was an action brought by the Creamery Co. against the Toronto firm for a shipment of butter made to them amounting to \$200. The defendant claims the shipment was made to them as brokers, not as buyers, and put in a counter claim of \$37.50 for their services. Mr Walter Hastie, Sec'y of the Company, was the chief witness and his evidence showed that he had borne the chief burdens of the negotiations, leading up to the disputed sale and later to the suit. It appeared the Co. had acted more than once in a dual capacity, sometimes as buyer, sometimes as broker. They had sold this butter, but objection was made to its quality and it returned to them. The defendants had voluminous correspondence to justify their action and after lengthy addresses from respective counsels, His Honor dismissed the claim of the Plaintiffs, granted the counter claim of the Defendants, and added a counsel fee of \$20.
