County Roads

Although we are spending considerable money each year on our County and Provincial Roads, yet I believe we have made one change which will help to make many and we must not forget that, though we have been recommending changes, they have to be approved by the Dept. of Highways before they can be made, and again if changes are made this year, requests for changes will likely be presented every year.

Education

The cost of Education is increasing each year and it is an expenditure over which we have no control. We cannot say that the education we received was good enough for us and should be good enough for our children. The Gov't. says this is not a fact, but is working on the principle that a good education is the best asset we can give the youth of to-day.

House of Refuge

The question is now before us, "What are we going to do about the enlargement of our home for the aged and infirm?" The Province is trying to force on this and other counties those mentally deficient who are harmless but are still not capable of looking after themselves.

Finance

The finances of our County are still in good shape and although we will have a report from our Treasurer, showing a deficit of from \$1200 to \$1500, it is not as large a deficit as we had thought.

Bridge

We are gradually replacing the old narrow bridges with new bridges of the regulation width, now necessary as your Warden.

AN EARLY BANK OF MONTREAL "TOKEN"

FOUNDED before Canada had any currency of its own, the Bank of Montreal early obtained authorization from the Government to issue copper tokens for small change.

Reproduced herewith are the two sides of the "Bouquet" token, one of the earliest coins issued by the Bank. The intermingling of the rose, shamrock and thistle indicates the three branches of the British people—the English, Scotch and Irish—while the use of English on one side of the coin and French on the other is significant of the mingling of the two races in this country.

"Trade and Agriculture" indicates the early connection of the Bank with both urban and rural life in Canada.
