VICTIMS—NOT SUCKERS

Those who lose their money as the result of high pressure stock salesmen, tipping sheets and other forms of floating fake promotions are usually referred to as "suckers" and the so-called "sucker list" on which their names appear is one of the chief assets in such operations.

Fraudulent promotion has been reduced to a science. When a professional fraudulent promoter goes out to get money, the game is an unequal one.

The tendency to classify all those who put money into fraudulent promotions as "suckers" is wrong from several angles. In the first place, these individuals are not 'suckers', but victims of cleverly worked out schemes.

Much more effective work could be done in preventing swindles if a larger percentage of those victimized would report the details of their transactions. A good way to encourage this is to treat these individuals as victims of a cleverly worked out swindle rather than as 'suckers' who have foolishly put their money in a proposition obviously fraudulent.
