## Egremont Council

Council met March 12, members all present, minutes adopted.

Hunter-Mack: That three Reeve be instructed to sign pay sheet No 3 for work performed on roads. Carried.

Hunter-Mack: That the clerk be instructed to write the Dist. Manager of the Bell Telephone Co. in reference to promise given to have a 5c rate of exchange between Durham and Mt Forest. Carried.

By-laws were passed authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow such sums of money as required to meet the current expenditure of the Township, also providing for expenditure on roads.

Hunter-Phil: That the rate of payment for work performed on roads be as follows: Man and team 50c per hour; man 25c per hour; gravel to be paid for at the rate of 10c per yard, a load of gravel to be 1 1/2 yds. Car.

Phil-Robb: That the clerk send a notice to those who have been afflicted with small pox of the amounts that have been paid for attendance on them, requiring such to pay to the Treasurer of the municipality the amount which said municipality has paid for them as required by Statute. Said amount must be paid or obligation acknowledged by September 29, 1928. Carried.

Robb-Phil: That the following accounts be paid: pay sheet No 3 for work performed on roads \$48.62; superintendent's services \$7; members of council, att'ce at meeting to date, \$15; use of room \$2.

Council adjourned to meet Monday, April 16, at 10 o'clock a.m. for general business.

## RULES OF THE HOUSE

An order passed in the British House of Commons prohibits the chewing of tobacco in the Chamber. This rule has never been observed in Ottawa. If it was, certain Maritime members would have to beat hasty retreats. Beauchesne's parliamentary rules specify that silence is required in both the Commons and Senate. In the Commons all members may converse in a whisper. Apparently the Senators can be as loud as they like. The rules ordain that members are not allowed to read books, newspapers or letters in the Chamber. This rule was made to be broken, for it is seldom observed. As a matter of fact most of the members write the bulk of their personal letters in the House.
