Miss McLean was a good church lady and when at the old home in Proton, she often made the remark that they could not make fences to keep her from trespassing by taking a short cut through the farms in Artemesia, coming to the old kirk at the graveyard. Miss McLean had a fine personality in her youthful days and often remarks made said that she was fatter of her sex coming to the old kirk. Her hair in curls showed that she took pride of her beautiful hair, and as bobbing was a thing to be practised by her sex in future, she did not know what it meant.

The old pioneers are passing away fast. Miss McLean was laid to rest in McNeal's cemetery. Mr McNeal was a cousin of deceased and his liberality in granting the 5 acres for a cemetery is appreciated. It is pretty well dotted with monuments.

The toll of the bell had hardly ceased when its mournful dirge was again heard, telling of the passing away of a young man in the prime of manhood, Archie McDonald, nephew of the McArthur's, near Dornoch. Good Papers Given at Durham Women's Inst.

Thirty six ladies gathered at the home of Mrs E. Ashley on Thursday last for the April meeting of the Women's Institute and spent a pleasant afternoon.

The usual business and correspondence was dealt with: a letter was read from the Sec'y of the Armenian Relief, expressing appreciation of the help the Institute were giving and explained some changes in the work. Two boxes of clothing, layette, quilt, etc, have recently been sent to a Spanish station in New Ontario from the district. Miss Margaret McGillivray was made a member of the League of Nations Society and will receive the literature published and will keep the members in active touch with the activities of the League of Nations.

There were two interesting papers. Mrs Chas. Moore gave a timely and helpful paper on 'Floor finishes, their advantages and disadvantages.' She told how to treat the different woods and the finishes required for best service and appearance. Wall finishes were also dealt with.

Mrs McPherson's paper was also instructive. Her subject was 'Beautiful Hair, shampooing, care and dress sing.' She began by telling the formation of the hair and how the general health and blood supply must be good if we would have healthy hair. As the hair was a 'woman's crowning glory' it should not be neglected any more than our bodies. As health was the royal road to beauty' let us not neglect our health. Mrs McPherson also answered several questions asked at the close of her talk. The choir gave two selections which were much enjoyed 'The heart that was broken for me' and 'Nailed to the Cross.' There was community singing.
