The crowning work of his life was his successful inauguration of the Union of Canadas, which was conceived by Lord Durham and executed by Lord Sydenham. His body was interred on the 24th Sept. 1841, beneath the floor of St. George's Church, Kingston. "And so Lord Sydenham slept his last sleep, 3000 miles distant from his native land and the tombs of his ancestors.
