## Crawford United Church Held Golden Jubilee

LARGELY ATTENDED SERVICES

Sunday and Monday, July 1 and 2, Crawford United Church celebrated its Golden Jubilee or fifty years existence as a church centre. To be exact, the former Presbyterian body have been organized 50 years and the former Methodist body 52 years, but these two have become as one since 1921 and few rural churches to-day can bear testimony of good works performed for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom as has this appointment.

Fifty years in the lifetime of a congregation may witness many changes. The first church building, the completion of fifty years, be looking with mature eye on its grandchild, now also attending the same church. If the church were given power to speak and tell of the many events, sad and joyful, held within its walls in that period, these columns could not do justice to them. But in Crawford during all these years, "the eye has not been dimmed or the natural sight abated" in seeking after higher truths and to-day there are no more devout followers of the lowly Nazarene than those attending Crawford United Church. They have caught the torch thrown to them from their forbears and have ever held it aloft.

So on Sunday last from far and near, Crawford church was the mecca and its every corner was taxed to the utmost. The speaker of the morning was Rev. John Little, now pastor of Conn United Church. Over 20 years ago, Mr Little was pastor of Dornoch and Rocky congregations, and had occasion frequently to attend Crawford church as a brother pastor and had the honor of opening the new church, now 30 years old.

Rev. Mr Little selected for his text 2 Chron. 7: 14; the same text as at the opening and in all these years, his message has lost none of its earnestness and vim. In expounding that text, he pointed out that God's pathway of blessing involved four conditions: 1st, that His people would humble themselves; 2nd, that they would pray (for prayer will move the arm that moves the sky); 3rd, that they would seek His face; and lastly, would turn from wicked ways. We cannot be Sunday Christians only.

The church was again filled to the doors at an evening service when Rev. S. E. Couch, a former Methodist pastor, delivered an inspiring address. Music was supplied by the local choir and the Victoria Male quartette of Hanover.

On the choir platform and pulpit were ranged older members of the congregation from near and far and a voluntary was sung by eight members of the impromptu choir, led by a precursor of many years, Mr. Andrew Milne. The others were S. A. Morrison, Insp. F. O. Grey and Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. R. Twamley, Mrs. Kidd Wm Cooke, Jno. Sherman and Jas. Milne of Elderslie. The congregational hymns were all of the old time numbers and the singing of 'Kilmarnock' and 'French' never sounded sweeter.

We are publishing elsewhere the history of Crawford churches as read by the pastor, Rev. Mr Young, and to whom we are kindling old time for same. These make excellent historical data and should be preserved.

The Garden Party Monday evening, was a successful sequel to Sunday's services. The night was ideally warm for an outdoor function and the man in the moon, almost full, smiled his approval. Rev. Mr Young was chairman over the large gathering, numbering about 600 and had as clerical assistants, Rev's Crickington of Mulock Baptist Church; Rev. Mr Pinchoe, a former Mulock pastor; Rev. Mr Couch, the speaker of Sunday night, and Rev. W. H. Smith B. A. of Durham. Rev. Mr Couch had a special subject on "Laughter" while Rev. Mr. Smith dwelt on the topic "Say it with Flowers" and it is surprising how many things can result from the topic. The Victoria Male Quartette of Hanover contributed several selections: Monk and Schmitt rendered orchestra selections, as did the Sharp family on violins; solo, Miss Elsie Boyce; recitation, Miss Marion Lamont. The ladies of the congregation provided a wonderful supper and to which all did justice. Gate receipts were \$136.00 on a 55c and 15c admission fee.
