DO CITY FARMERS MAKE MONEY?

A feature of the second day of Farm Boys' Week at Macdonald College was the privilege extended to the boys of inspecting some of the finest cattle on the continent. These cattle were not on the farms of men whose chief reputation is for the breeding of livestock, for, as a matter of fact in Quebec as in some other provinces, many outstanding livestock farms are owned and operated by men whose names are most familiar to the business world. In this case it was to the well known farms of T. B. Macaulay, President of the Sun Life and of Hon. Donald Raymond, at Vaudeuil, that the boys were taken. The Macaulay farm herds Johanna Rag Apple Pabst, the only four times all-American bull, which has commanded a market price of \$15,000.

In connection with this visit, it is not recorded that statements of profit and loss, or balance sheets were produced for the benefit of the boys. Perhaps just as well not if their ambitions in this direction are to be encouraged, for it is not on record that the same success in dollars and cents attends the operations of our business leaders in their agricultural as in their financial and commercial ventures.

DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE

POULTRY WORK

Because of the necessity of developing intensive research work at the Poultry Branch O.A.C. Guelph, the policy of the Dept. has been altered. Heretofore all cockerels used at the Poultry Breeding stations from which eggs were secured for the school fairs were supplied by the O. A. C. Funds provided and space devoted to the Poultry Dept. have been so limited that only research problems can be undertaken.

The supplying of eggs to the children will henceforth therefore not be carried on. In order that the farmers may have a source of high class breeding stock the Dept. are going to carry out the following policy of system of Flock Improvement.

1. Any standard breed will be specially selected and inspected by fully qualified inspectors four times a year.
2. Records must be kept and all Poultry houses must show cleanliness.
3. Good health and quality of stock are essential.
4. Applications must be made before Sept. 1st.
5. All birds must pass inspection, must be properly banded, etc.
6. Proper records must be kept at all times.

T. Stewart Cooper, Grey Co. Br. Dept. of Agriculture, is especially anxious that applications be received

at once. The information instruction and Poultry advice which will be imparted will be of untold value to any farmer or farmer's wife. All farmers writing to the Dept. of Agriculture, Markdale, will receive a copy of the regulations. An expert from the Poultry Branch will be in Grey Co. the 1st week in August. It is proposed at that time to look over all applicants flocks whose application has been received.

BATTLESHIP GREY

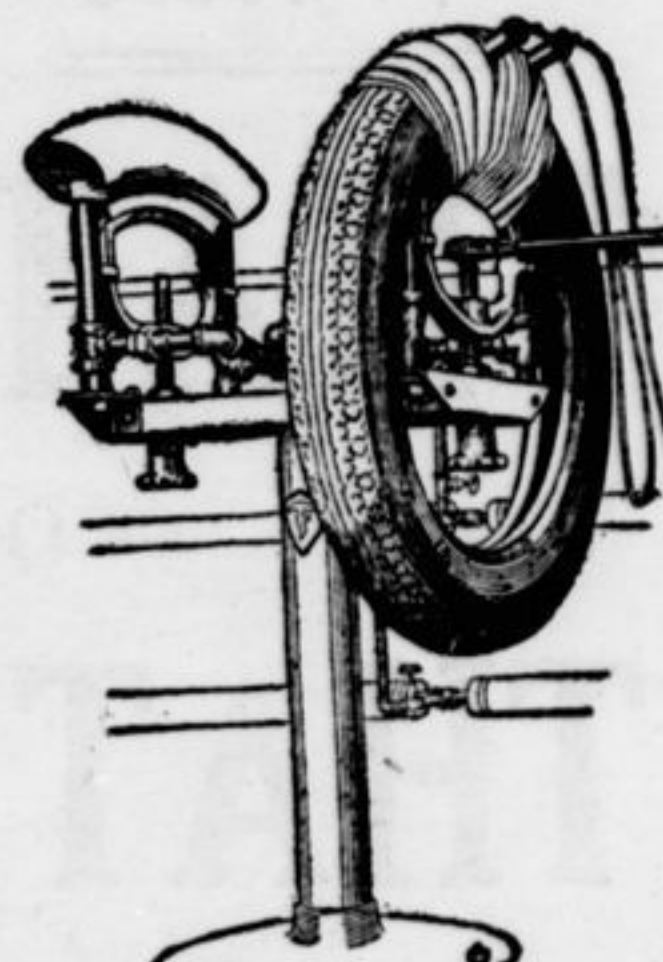
