His Grace preached from the text, "Walk worthy of the vocation where with ye are called."

He said that 300 years ago, the general belief was that a person's vocation was chosen by God. To-day, we choose our own vocations, or at least thought we did. Man had come to believe that he controlled every department of his life. But there were many things about his life, which he did not control. In fact he had no choice in the matter. He did not choose the place or time of his birth, yet his life was greatly affected by both. He did not choose the nation or circumstances into which he was born, yet these made him rich or poor, accepted or despised by the nations. There were many other contingencies in life which he did not choose, such as health and accident, but these made or marred our happiness. We should do well to realize that God has a part in our vocation—that the Christian's vocation is of God.

We were called to God to Christian Brotherhood. He spoke of the obligations of Brotherhood.

We were called to walk as Christians so that the world would know it.

We were called to witness to the World.

He closed with an appeal to the candidates to walk worthy of their vocation.
