### The Wonder Horse

His name is "Black Bear." He is a little black stallion, ten and a half years old, owned by Thomas Barrett of Briarcliff, New York. Since he was five months old he has been the constant companion and pet of his master. Such remarkable things have been said about this little fellow's ability to answer questions that some time ago, having to speak at Briarcliff, we were given the opportunity to see him and test his mysterious power. Two racks, each holding the letters of the alphabet, and also two racks, each holding the figures from 1 to 10 are before him. The first thing the owner did was to say, "Black Bear, can you tell who it is who has come from Boston to see you?" Black Bear nodded his head and going to the rack took off the letters that spelt the name of the president of our two societies. Then, "Can you tell the state from which he comes?" One by one the letters were taken from the rack which spelt out the long word "Massachusetts." After several other answers to somewhat similar questions the writer was given a slate by Mr. Barrett and asked to put down five or six rows of figures, with five or six in a line, and add them up. The total was 22,441. Neither Black Bear nor his owner could see the figures or the total. "Can you give the total?" said Mr. Barrett to the pony. Nodding his head, Black Bear went to the rack of figures and took off first a 2, then another 2, and so on to a 4, another 4, then a 1: 22,441.

Here we stop with our story, though many other things were done for which we could find no explanations. There were discoverable no signs on the part of the owner by which the pony could be guided. The reason we recount no more of what we witnessed is because we have just received the report of Frederick Bligh Bond and Arthur Goadby of the American Society for Physical Research in a study of Black Bear. To save space and time we quote a few of the tests to which the pony was subjected particularly by Mr. Bond.

"I drew on the board a chalk square about four inches wide and exhibited this to the pony, who seemed to study it attentively. I said, 'Do you know what this is?' The pony nodded. I said, 'What is it?' He turned to the rack and at once picked out the letters 'S-Q-U-A-R-E.'

"I then draw one of the diagonals of the square and showed it to the pony, asking him the same question. The word 'diagonal' was in my mind and I anticipated that the line would be as described by Mr. Bond.

"I now drew a circle and showed it to the pony, who looked at it carefully as before. I asked, 'What is this?' He went to the rack and spelt out 'C-I-R-C-L-E.' I then drew the circle within the square previously drawn, and asked for the measure of the square when the circle was 22 in circumference. The pony hesitated, then turned to the rack and picked out the letters 'W-O-N-T-G-O.' 'What will go?' I asked. He picked out the numbers '2' and '7', and then signified his dissatisfaction by shaking his head. (Note: The fraction would be over 21 and just under 22.)

"I now drew a right-angled triangle and figured the sides '3' and '4' respectively. This I showed to the pony and said, 'I want you, please to give me the length of the hypotenuse,' that being '5'. Without any hesitation, he picked out the '5'. Thinking this fact might be known to Mr. Barrett, I drew another triangle and figured the two sides containing the right angle as '5' and '12', then repeating the question. The pony, without any delay whatever, advanced to the rack and selected the figures '1' and '3', implying 13, the number of the hypotenuse.

"I then drew a Hebrew Aleph (A). As drawn, this letter does not easily suggest an analogy of our 'A', but looks more like an 'X' instead. 'Do you know what this is?' The pony shook his head. I said, 'Do you know what language it is?' Again he indicated 'no.' I then said, 'Say what you think it looks like to you. After a short pause, Mr. Barrett said, 'Well, have you anything to say?' and the pony nodded. He then picked out the letter 'A'.

"I then said to the pony, 'As you have got so far and you know this, can you not give me the name of this letter?' (Aleph was expected.) I said, 'If you don't know, try to get the information.' By this time a 'Greek' influence would seem to have filtered into the brain of the pony, for instead of giving me the Hebrew letter he, to my astonishment, picked out 'A-L-P-H-A.'

"Whilst he was doing this, Mr. Barrett, who evidently thought that the pony was going astray and getting confused, said, 'What are you getting at?' I said, 'He's all right. Don't stop him, please.' The pony then went on and gave me 'B-E-T-A.' There was not the slightest suggestion that he should continue the alphabet, so this was another surprise. Mr. Barrett maintained his protests, but the pony went on, and gave in succession 'C-A-M-M-E-L-E-T-A.' This was under difficulties, as his owner several times interfered, plainly nervous and thinking it was all nonsense."

The winners each got a bathing suit, and every entrant received a pencil box.

The show was a feature of the Bellevue-Yorkville health demonstration's safety and health campaign that is being conducted through July and August. Each week the children present a stunt which teaches some form of health or safety lesson. Among the judges were "Uncle Robert" Correy, radio entertainer, and Mrs. George Adams, of the New York Women's League for Animals. Dr. Leverett D. Bristol is in charge of the demonstration.

### Canadian Studebaker Reorganized

chases of materials and equipment produced in Canada, to be used in the Walkerville factories. "The expansion of our manufacturing program in Canada will also include a considerable increase in export shipments from the Walkerville plants. With the accumulation of more Canadian element in our Walkerville built cars, we will be enabled to ship automobiles to Great Britain under the preferential tariff, as well as to New Zealand and certain other British possessions overseas. On export shipments from Canada into British possessions giving a preferential duty on Canadian-built cars, owners in these countries profit directly by the increase of Canadian element in the cars. "This move is a result of Studebaker's faith in Canada," said Mr. Grossman. "We believe there will be wonderful developments in this country and through this expansion program, we will naturally become a part of those developments.

### Hedin Plans Two More Years in Wastes of Asia

#### Sweden's Foremost Explorer Returns to Stockholm to Replenish His Equipment

Stockholm.—After more than a year and a half of hardships and adventures in the interior of China, Sven Hedin, Sweden's foremost living explorer, has just returned to Stockholm for a brief visit. While in Sweden he will add more members to his expedition, purchase new instruments and a number of motor cars which he has been commissioned to buy for Governor Yang of the Mongolian Province Hsin-tchchang, and also make arrangements for airplanes to carry him further into the uncharted wastes of Asia. Dr. Hedin, who is a member of the Swedish Academy, is determined to continue his scientific researches for another two years. He has left all the members of his expedition in or about Urumtchi, in the interior of the Province Hsin-tchchang, and during his absence the explorations and compiling of data continue. Aside from Dr. Hedin, the members of the party comprise Swedish, Danish, German, Chinese and Mongolian scientists. About 6,177 square miles, which previously were white spots on the map, have been carefully charted and 52,480 feet of film have been taken. A collection of some 18,600 numbers, consisting of ancient arrows, hammers and other paraphernalia, has been found. Due to the friendly assistance of Governor Yang, the expedition was allowed to proceed uninterrupted. Yang, said Dr. Hedin, rules his province with an autocratic hand and has managed to stay out of the strife between the other warring lords. His regard for the Swedish scientists was heightened by an operation which Dr. Humei, the physician of the party, performed on him. In Urumtchi a house was given over to the expedition to be used as headquarters, and in many other ways the Mongolian ruler showed his interest in the venture.

The success of the expedition is due to a large extent to F. A. Larsson, business manager and caravan leader. Larsson, who is a resident of Mongolia and for many years has been an adviser to the Chinese Government on Mongolian affairs, has had conferred upon him the popular title of "Duke of Mongolia."

### Blondes More Susceptible To Circulation Diseases

London.—Blondes, in London at least are being pushed aside by brunettes. According to London medical experts, golden-haired beauties will in a comparatively short time be scarce, owing to their predisposition to circulation diseases, to which they offer less resistance than the dark-haired types. "The Italians and the Welsh and races of their type thrive in places like London, and the fair-haired races tend to do so," says Dr. C. J. Thomas, of the London County Council medical department, who collected statistics on the subject. Dr. T. Jenner Hoskin, heart specialist at the Royal Free Hospital, confirms this statement in pronouncing that "rheumatism prefers blonds and children with blond or red hair are more prone to rheumatism and heart trouble than the darker types."

### Canada's Great Use of the Air

#### Planes Help to Conserve and Develop Her vast Natural Resources

Each year aviation is playing a larger part in the conservation and development of natural resources in Canada. Aerial transport is solving many problems of forester, geologist and explorer. The 1928 program of the Royal Canadian Air Force in civil operations for Government departments includes: Provision of twenty hours flying time for emergency fire periods in British Columbia; continuation of the air patrol in Alberta, intensification of aerial patrols over 14,500,000 acres long forest in Saskatchewan, continuation of fire prevention and suppression covering 40,000,000 acres in Manitoba; photographic surveys in the Nelson River watershed in connection with possible pulp and paper development and in the Saskatchewan patrol area for the preparation of maps for the use of air patrol.

Other work will include a vertical aerial photograph in connection with mapping the Rouyn, Sudbury and the Pas mineral areas, the Gatinau, Opinaka and Chicoutimi districts in Quebec, the Shelburne and Guysborough districts in Nova Scotia and the Moncton district in New Brunswick; oblique aerial photography for mapping the Dryden, Quetico and Rainy Lake districts in Ontario, the Lac La Ronge, Lac Mironde and Reindeer Lake areas in Saskatchewan, vertical photography in the St. Ann area in Alberta; oblique photography to complete the mapping of Wood Buffalo Park, near Fort Smith.

### Folks' Ignorance Saddens Bermuda

#### World Appears to Know Nothing of Island's Ban on Autos

Hamilton, Bermuda.—Local residents are somewhat downcast over what they consider the amazing ignorance of others regarding Bermuda's prohibition of motor cars. Every now and then someone writes a letter to The Bermuda Trade Development Board asking about automobile roads, the cost of gasoline, and whether cars have to be crated for shipment to the island parades. Bermuda has always forbidden automobiles, motorcycles, railways, and street cars, following a very brief test during which a single automobile known as "The Scarlet Runner" appeared on the roads and struck consternation into the hearts of the inhabitants. That was in 1907, and no cars have been allowed in Bermuda since then. The latest evidence of dense ignorance concerning Bermuda is revealed by a letter received by the Chief of Police of Bermuda offering \$50 reward for recovery of a 1925 Ford touring car taken by the wife of the man who wrote the letter. Bermuda is enjoying its largest summer season.

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### French Airwoman Beats World's Light Plane Record

Paris—Mlle. Maryse Bastie, one of France's few airwomen, recently beat the world's distance record for light craft, flying from Le Bourget to Treptow in Pomerania, a distance of 3,270 kilometers (788.67 miles) in eleven hours. During the flight she used a Caudron plane with a 40-horsepower Salmson engine.
