Durham Masons Honor Pastmaster E. A. Hay

At the regular meeting of Durham Lodge A. F. & A. M. on Tuesday night, a large number of the brethren assembled, the outstanding feature being a farewell evening to Past Master E. A. For twenty years Mr Hay has been a model citizen of Durham and almost twenty years has been associated with the local Masonic lodge going through the chairs to the highest gift of the lodge. New Dust Layer Applied on Prov'l Highway

Not only the motorists but many farmers and their families resident along No. 6 Prov'l Highway from Durham, seven miles south to Orchard Mills corner, have had their hearts gladdened this week to see the dust nuisance removed.

On Monday and Tuesday, Mr Thos. Jones, representative of the Municipal Oiling and Spraying Co. of Toronto, was here, in charge of two tank cars of a newly discovered dust layer, liquid calcium chloride. This stretch of road—Durham to Orchard Mills—is the second in Ontario to be treated, the first at Rice Lake. The liquid is much cheaper than the ordinary calcium chloride and can be laid at a cost of about \$150 a mile.

This liquid chloride is produced from a well at Concord, Ont. 14 miles north of Toronto and is owned by Mr R. I. Henderson of the Ontario Bldg Co., Toronto. The material consists of oil trace, oxide of iron, lime calcium, soda chlorine and water. Its cost is not yet settled as it has not yet been classified by the railroad companies, and haulage charges are not determined.

These two tank cars shipped to Durham contain each 8370 and 5001 gallons of the liquid chloride—over 13000 in all. From these a truck with tank of capacity of 605 gallons is filled. On the truck is also mounted a separate engine running an air pump, which gives a pressure of 10 to 50 lbs to drive the liquid material into the road bed. The truck is operated by Mr Ellis and a son of Mr Jones, who when starting to operate Monday, had to purchase smoked glasses to wear, so blinding was the dust from passing cars.

In company with Mr Jones, who was most obliging in explaining everything, the Review was privileged to see the truck at work south of Maplewood cemetery and the pressure with which the liquid is ejected on the roadbed penetrates it a depth of 1 1/4 to 3 inches. To actually test it, we dug a hole in the roadbed, treated the previous day and it had sunk well in. And the beauty of it was, no dust visible behind cars on the treated surface. Its efficacy lasts for several months. It is best to apply it twice a year—Spring and early fall. Nearly 2000 gallons are required per mile of Prov. highway width, thus the truck tank had to be refilled for about every half mile of road surface covered.

The Ontario Gov't is paying for this local 7-mil strip as an experiment. It looks to be the material they have been looking for as a cheap dust preventative for the un-paved highways of the province and next year may see hundreds of miles of Ontario's highways thus sprayed. It is said an inch and a half depth of gravel is required to yearly maintain the highway: this blows off in dust to the detriment of farm crops and orchards and homes, near the road-side, besides the annoyance to traffic. It may prove considerably cheaper to thus spray and maintain the gravel and than to frequently spread gravel and drag: it will certainly ensure more comfort for all. There are other parts of the Prov'l Highway system adjacent to Durham where the dust nuisance still flourishes and it might be beneficial if those living alongside would agitate with the powers that be for a similar boon. At least the residents of the south are now "sitting pretty."

52 Mills 1928 Tax Rate: Up 4 from last Year

The striking of the 1928 tax rate was the chief business before the Town Council Monday and this year the Council had no other option than to increase it from 48 to 52 mills, to meet the financial requirements of school boards and current town upkeep and debentures.

The higher rate may be attributed largely to the higher estimates of the two school boards. Last year the Public School Board levied from town \$7720. This year they ask \$8535, an increase of \$815. The new boiler being installed is mainly responsible for the larger figure as salaries remain as they were.
