## No Gambling Devices

Allowed at Fall Fairs

The following letter has been sent to all Ag. Society officials: To the President and Sec'y, Agricultural Society Gentlemen:

Complaints have already reached me that objectionable side-shows, Wheels-of-Fortune and Gambling Devices are being permitted to operate in connection with Fairs held under the auspices of Agricultural Societies in this Province. I beg to call the attention of your Officers and Directors to the notice which was issued on this matter on Aug. 21st, 1925, which read as follows: "The Officers of the Society shall prevent all immoral or indecent shows and all kinds of gambling and all games of chance, including wheels of fortune, dice games, pools, coin tables, draw lotteries or other illegal games at the place of holding the Exhibition or Fair, or within 300 yards thereof, and any Association or Society permitting such illegal proceedings shall forfeit all claims to any legislative grant during the next year ensuing."

Now that the Department has given fair notice, there can be no complaint or appeal if the grant is discontinued, when the operation of such objectionable side shows has been proven. I am instructed to advise you that the Section of the Act above quoted, will be strictly enforced this year and I am confident that we may count on the hearty co-operation of your officers and the law abiding members of your Society to see that no violations are permitted in connection with the Fair in your charge.

entered in the Grey Co home garden Contest, has now been completed by A. S. Smith, B.S.A. asst representative.

In all there were 224 gardens entered into four contests. For purposes of contest, the Co. was divided into four sections with the total number of gardens in each township as follows:

No. 1: Proton 29, Egremont 16, Normansby 11, Total 55.

No. 2: Bentinck 12, Glenelg 12, Artemesia 15, Osprey 18, Total 57.

No. 3: Collingwood 5, Euphrasia 15, Holland 17, Sullivan 5, Markdale 7, Sydenham 5, Total 54.

No. 4: Derby 16, Keppel 24, Sarawak 4, St Vincent 13, Total 57.

TO INSPECTORS AND TEACHERS OF PUBLIC & SEPARATE SCHOOLS

Courses in History

The attention of inspectors and teachers of Public and Separate Schools is directed to the following changes that have been made in the courses and examinations in History. These changes come into effect in September 1928.

FORM IV

The leading events in British History Great events in current history The element of the civil government of Ontario.

The duties of citizenship Supplementary Reading of British History story-books within the capacity of the pupils.

Senior Grade: The leading events of Canadian History. Great events of current history The elements of the civil government of Canada.

The duties of citizenship Supplementary reading of Canadian History story-books within the capacity of the pupils.

The text book in British History for the Junior Grade is the Ontario Public School History of England. The text book in Canadian History for the Senior Grade is the new text book known as a First Book of Canadian History. This text will be available early in September. It is published by the Macmillan Co. of Canada at a retail price of 30c each.

The question paper in History for the High School Entrance examination in 1929 and thereafter will be based on the course prescribed for the Senior Grade of Form IV. The paper will also test candidates as to their knowledge of the facts contained in the pamphlet "The Fathers of Confederation." Copies of this pamphlet may be obtained on application from the Deputy Minister of Education.

FORM V. Commencing with September 1928, the course in History for the Lower

School of the High and Continuation schools will be a course on British History. Accordingly the course in History for Fifth Form Classes of the Public and Separate Schools will be the same as that prescribed for the Lower School of the High and Continuation Schools. Teachers should, therefore, obtain copies of the High School Courses of Study as revised in 1928.
