Dr. L.G. Campbell, Markdale again Conservative Candidate

South East Grey Conservatives believe in taking time by the forelock, and on Monday at a nominating Convention in Durham Town Hall, placed Dr. L. G. Campbell of Markdale, in the field for the Dominion House, to oppose Miss Agnes C. Macphail, M. P. at the next Federal election. Dr. Campbell was her opponent in 1925, the election previous to the last one in 1926, when he was defeated by 1419 votes.

There was a good attendance Monday, about 170 being present, and 25 of these were ladies. Considerable enthusiasm and optimism was shown, especially when some speaker proclaimed Agnes Macphail must, or would be beaten. Almost every nominee and speaker resented her occupying her present seat, and none were backward in expressing it. President Dan McTavish, Flesher-ton, was chairman and Sec'y A. E. Colgan read the rules and regulations re nominations. On calling for nominees, nine were named: one lady, Mrs Austin E. Ball, Hanover, daughter-in-law of the former member, and eight men: Dr. Campbell, R. T. Edwards, Glenelg, the last candidate; T. S. Cooper, Markdale, who was not present; M. S. Armstrong, Hanover; Nelson Perdue, Holland; John McDowell, Dundalk; Dan McTavish, of Flesher-ton; A. E. Colgan, Markdale.

Mr Colgan said there would be a candidate even if he had to stuf in the field. "Agnes Macphail can be (Continued on page 4.)

Queen St. United Church Hold Successful Annivers'ry

Sunday last was an interesting and uplifting season for members and adherents of Rev. Mr Fiddes' congregation. Large audiences assembled morning and evening, at the latter service every seat being occupied, chairs in the aisle and every vantage point was utilized. Knox Church released its evening service out of respect to its sister congregation. The preacher of the day was an old friend and pastor of ten or more years ago, Rev. E. S. Moyer and he met with a welcome which must have been gratifying. His topic in the evening was "The Unchangeable Christ" founded on the text in Hebrews 13:8, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever" and other verses of the same import, as in Hebrews 1:11, 12, "They shall perish, but thou remainest," and "Thou art the same, thy years shall not fail."

Such assertions had great comfort for the early Christians and should have for us. He pointed out that Nature would soon be putting on a new garb, but Jesus changes not. The clouds often appear in glory, but they soon pass away; the oak tree seems strong and enduring, but in time it too crumbles, but He "remains." Changes in us have to be removed, but "as for man his days are as grass" and he passes, but Jesus remains, and though the earth and the heavens shall "wax old as a garment they also shall be changed, but They are the same and thy years shall not fail."

He quoted very aptly from Tennyson: "Our little systems have their day, They have their day and cease to be." Very eloquently he urged we must follow the teaching of Jesus and for stability we must anchor our souls to the cross" and as He who suffered there promised, "Lo I am with you always", this should be just as comforting as the fact that He is the same yesterday, to-day and forever. He closed a fine discourse by the assurance that "the deep down things will stand."
