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Lady Heath's Flying Visit to U.S. and Canada

Britain's Star Feminine Pilot Arrives on Leviathan for an Aerial Tour

Lady Heath, England's best known woman flyer, will arrive on the Leviathan to induce American women to take a more practical interest in flying. She plans to make a tour of that country in a Gypsy Moth plane, the same type of ship with which she established an altitude record of 24,700 feet for light planes at the Croydon Airfield last month.

Incidentally, in making her altitude flight Lady Heath flew to a greater height than had ever been attained by any woman flyer. She made the climb in an hour and forty minutes. The plane was powered with a Cirrus motor.

Earlier this year Lady Heath made a flight alone from Cape Town, South Africa, to London in an Avro-Avian, covering the 10,000 miles in 165 flying hours. On the first lap of the flight, from Johannesburg, she suffered from the torrid heat and fainted soon after landing near the camp of a native tribe. The natives found her and revived her. She stayed with them two days before continuing to Matabele, Kaffirland, and across German Africa.

She wore ordinary street clothing during the entire journey, asserting that flying togs were unnecessary and that she was able to keep her nose powdered most of the time. The Avro-Avian plane which she used for this flight now belongs to Miss Amelia Earhart, who recently completed a tour across the country and back in it.

When Lady Heath owned it she had it painted a turquoise to match the stones in her ring. She made the entire flight without any serious mechanical trouble.

But she did experience trouble with political authorities. Sudanese officials refused to permit her to cross their territory without an escort. She overcame this difficulty by flying her plane north in company with that of Lieutenant Bentley of the South African Air Force.

At Cairo, however, the British authorities looked her over in an army shed at the Heliopolis Airfield and refused to let her fly the Mediterranean until she found an escort. After several days she was permitted to proceed at her own risk by the Air Ministry.

Lady Heath's achievements have not been confined to aviation. She is an athlete, the holder of the women's record for the high jump, a founder of the Women's Amateur Athletic Association of Great Britain and the author of the "Standard Manual on Women's Athletics." She has lectured on science at Aberdeen University, and hunted big game in Africa.

The itinerary of her American tour has not been completed, but it will include New York, many of the larger cities east of Chicago and Canada.

Slow-Motion Films Used to Study Ape's Kinship to Humans

Cambridge, Mass.—The slow motion picture has helped to clarify the relationship between the anthropoid ape and man.

The important point disclosed is that the apes are unable to stand wholly erect, although they are more nearly erect than any other animal. Man alone possesses this attribute. The research which sets definite limits to the ability of the anthropoids in this respect was conducted by Dr. Edward Reynolds, director of the Department of Anthropology of Peabody Museum, Harvard College.

The camera caught the gibbon, smallest of anthropoids, while running, when, to the eye, he has appeared to be almost completely erect. The camera "stopped" the gibbon's movements sufficiently to show that he was actually but little more than half erect as to thigh position. The skeletons of these animals, Dr. Reynolds says, are so shaped that the thigh cannot be extended and, in consequence, they stand about half of man's erectness. The only animal other than the anthropoids which rises naturally on its hind legs to half erectness is the bear.

"The result of the studies," Dr. Reynolds says, "shows the modifications of the human skeleton, which permit of the erect posture. Men alone possess the quality of being able to spring from their hind feet in any direction. This quality has been partially developed, but only partially, in the anthropoids. No sane man for a moment believes that man descended from the apes, but that they may be descended from the same common ancestor."

Another significant difference of the anthropoid from man is that none is able to oppose its thumb against its fingertips. The nearest approach is putting the side of the thumb against the side of the finger. The orangoutan, Dr. Reynolds describes as having nearly four hands, using both hands and feet to grasp branches when swinging through trees, and being almost incapable of rising on its hind feet.

Still Troublesome

British Retain Grip on Ireland De Valera Says in Attack on Treaty

Dublin—Eamon de Valera told an audience in County Donegal that Great Britain is as firmly entrenched in Ireland as ever. He said that if war were to occur between England and the United States, Ireland's harbors would furnish naval bases for attacks on American commerce.

The British, he said, are still established in the principal seaports and British troops are garrisoned in the leading cities. He pointed out that this condition was provided for in the treaty between England and the Free State. The same treaty provided that Ireland's coast defense would be undertaken by the British government until some other arrangement could be effected.

He held that Ireland would be considered hostile territory by any power with which England might be at war.

Touching on the financial agreement between Ireland and England, he said that the amount of money Ireland was obliged to pay each year to England was more in proportion to Irish population than England pays to the United States on the war debt. The amount is approximately \$25,000,000. Most of this represents annual installments on money advanced by Britain to help tenants become land owners.

The Free State now collects these installments and turns them over to the British government.

League Helps Solve Tax Problems

Legislation in favor of the investor and capitalist who owns property outside of his own country and who has to pay double taxes on his holdings may be brought about if the present conference of government experts on double taxation and fiscal evasion being held at Geneva under the auspices of the League of Nations is successful. "Interdependence," the monthly review of the League of Nations Society of Canada, points out that the various problems of this nature have passed out of the theoretical into the practical stage and that the twenty-eight countries participating in the conference should be able to eventually relieve and reform the present vexed situation. Points being dealt with by the meeting in Geneva include four draft conventions respectively on double taxation of income, double taxation of death duties, on administrative assistance in matters of taxation, and judicial assistance in the collection of taxes.
