Lavelle had blocked a shot and was on the ice at side of nets, when Van Horne lifted in the rebound. The visitors attempted many long shots but Lavelle was bombproof. The first period was in Durham's favor, Walkerton had the edge on opening of second, Durham at close, while the last was more strenuous and very even till near the close when the visitors pressed their attack to even the count.

**Beat Markdale 3-2: Durham now Dist. Champions.**  
By defeating Markdale 3 to 2 on their own ice Wednesday evening, Durham captured the Int. O. H. A. District without a loss; in fact any Durham team has yet to lose a game this year. It was the closest call yet however, as up to 7 min. before the finish Markdale led 2 to 1. Elvidge then tied the score for Durham and Buschlen got the winning counter. The pace had been too fast and Markdale witted at the finish. Markdale scored 2 and Durham 1 (Buschlen) in first period, none in second, and Durham 2 in final. Armstrong of Toronto was a strict referee. We regret time prevents a full report.

Durham Club ran an excursion to Markdale and fared well. 118 accompanied the team from town, 40 from Flesherston, and some from Priceville. A bumper crowd thus saw the game.

Durham's first O.H.A. semi-final opponents are not yet known; possibly Walkerton. Keep your eye open for announcement.

**Durham Wins 6-2 from Walkerton in Sr. Northern**  
One of the biggest hockey jolts and upsets of the season befell Walkerton's best line-up Monday night, when Durham handed them their worst defeat of the season on their own ice. And to add to the local's injury, Walkerton played their important Kitchener star, Trushinski, who has been refused an O. H. A. certificate this year. In O. H. A. games, Walkerton has lost only twice this winter, each time by 1 goal. Had Trushinski been playing they consider they might have had a clean sheet of victories. Then in his first game he was beaten 6-2 by Durham, the natives still wondering how it all happened.

Last winter Walkerton twice won from Durham—in both towns on heavy, sticky ice, where real hockey was impossible. The Durhams felt that the weather man had handed Walkerton the district honors then, their belief to have been justified. The clockwork and Elvidge and McGirr of the local crew, outskated and outguzzled the famous Trushinski. Elvidge scored three of the six goals and is said to have been the best man on the ice. McGirr counted two goals and Buschlen the last one when he broke away, beat the defence and picked the corner of the net.

At end of 1st period it was 3-0, and end of 2nd, 5-0 for Durham. Walkerton got first two in last period, making it 5-2, when they scored a neat wing shot and the 2nd goal was a pure fluke, when the puck unexpectedly rolled into the nets after a face-off near goal. Their hopes of a rally were soon dispelled however, when Buschlen made his nice rush for the final tally. On defence, Wilson and Clements played their best game of the winter, thwarting many determined attacks, while "Punk" McDonald in the nets was in unbeatable form. W. Snell and S. Rowe were alternates but did not get many minutes of play. Rucker of Listowel refereed and imposed only three penalties.

The second game will take place on Durham ice next Monday night, Feb. 11. Walkerton is yet hopeful of winning here, thus tying the district. The biggest crowd of the season should be on hand to see Northern district honors decided.

Miss Allie Norris, Flesherston, was operated upon for appendicitomy in Durham hospital last week end.

We regret we have to use the word "late" in regard to above gentleman, to whom came the last call on Monday night, Feb. 4th. He had suffered more than one stroke of paralysis and at last it has proved fatal. He was born on the farm he died on, 7th May 1854, and thus was in his 75th year. He was the last of a family of eleven children who have all preceded him.

He has been prominent in his industry and up-to-date methods enabled him to acquire a competence. He lost his wife by death about twenty years ago; she was Miss Elizabeth McLeod and the day he died was the 44th anniversary of their marriage. The union was a happy one. To them were born twelve children—nine daughters and three sons and all are yet alive, making a rare record.

The family are all here or near-by except Ida, who is a nurse in Salem, Oregon. The others are (Gertie) Mrs Russell Baird, Pontiac, Mich.; (Sadie), Mrs Wm Brown, Bunnassan; (Catherine) Mrs Robt Lawrence, Glen Glen; (Islay) Mrs Henry Tucker, S. Willa, a teacher, at Tiverton; John Alexander and Archie at home; Finlay at Mulock, in Bentinck. All have honored their home and their parents, as we heard one man say "not a black sheep among them."

For many years the late Mr MacCuaig was identified with the Grey & Bruce Fire Insurance Co. and always manifested the keenest interest in its management.

We cannot talk 'Archie MacCuaig' without referring to his municipal career. He took an intelligent interest in public affairs and entered the Council of Glenelg in 1884, staying there for 1885 and won the deputy-reeveship in 1886. We next find him in the Reeveship four years: 1917, 1918, 1922, 1923. Many will yet regret the prominent part he took in County Council. He was a fighter and a warm champion for any cause he advocated as many know.

He was secretary of the School Bd for 6 years and gave up his job only last fall. He was a member of the Priceville Presbyterian Church and took a great interest in its services, when in health and will be interred under its auspices on Thursday of this week, interment being made at the little St. Michael's cemetery at the end of the 'Glen'.

The community will miss Archie MacCuaig. He was intelligent to a degree. He will be missed for his kindly genial manner, as well as for his mentality. To the circle of mourners we extend our sympathy.

**Council has not yet Passed Paving By-law**  
Will Secure further information, then call special Meeting  
Manifesting an interest in the business of the town, a number of the ratepayers attended Monday night's Council session and heard some interesting discussions.

**I. O. D. E. Request Granted**  
Dr Grant addressed the Council on behalf of the I. O. D. E. asking for free use of the Town Hall for another year, in consideration of the fact that they had expended over \$1000 in renovating the Hall, and spent their funds for charitable purposes into town. The request was granted by Council.

**Pool Table license Reduced**  
Alex Hastie, proprietor of the local pool room, asked a reduction in license, claiming his was much higher than other towns around. Council Whitmore thought present rate \$75 for first table and \$25 for others was high and favored lowering. The Reeve thought no change desirable as others paying licenses might also ask reduction. Coun. Noble said he had enquired in other towns and found Durham rate almost double. He favored reducing rate by \$25 on first table and nothing on others, and his motion to this effect seconded by R. Whitmore, was carried. The license will thus be \$175 per year instead of \$200.

A request from Salvation Army Rescue Home in London for a grant was tabled. Accounts totalling \$596.36 presented by the Finance Com. were passed. Coun. P. J. McLean presented report of Property Com. re repairing of Fire Hall, the roof of which was blown off in recent windstorm. The
