

E. C. Drury's Opinion

At the Golden Jubilee of the Royal Templars of Temperance, the former Premier of Ontario made a notable speech from which we quote:

"I regarded the Ontario Temperance Act as a great success. But the law has been defamed by the liquor interests. His Government had taken the liquor question out of politics because it had been the experience of the past that liquor in politics left a trail of corruption. But the principle of deciding the question by direct vote had been reversed. So-called Gov't Control provided less control for liquor than there had been in 50 years. It encouraged consumption in the home, which he felt was worse than drinking anywhere else. Liquor was becoming entrenched as a social custom and entrenched in the finances of the Province as shown by the huge liquor revenue."

He declared that Canada was being disgraced from end to end by the Provinces selling liquor and allowing border points to be used as a legal base for outlaws who carried crime and violence into a neighboring country.

GREY CO. MOTHERS ARE RECEIVING OVER \$20,000

For the year ending Oct. 31st, 1927, there was paid out by the Provincial Government a little over \$2,000,000 for the support of mothers under the Mothers' Allowance Act. Of this \$17,960 was paid to Bruce mothers and \$20,920 to Grey mothers. Dr. Jamieson, the chairman, received \$1,740 and Rev. Peter Bryce who preceded him, \$855 for his part of the year. All the members of the local County boards get expenses which in the case of the three Bruce members was \$12.50 and the three Grey members \$193.55.

Sailed down Saugeen in raft

Born in Egremont Township
Daughter of English parents, who were among the earliest settlers in the Bruce peninsula, to be born on a farm cleared out of the virgin bush and to be the first white Canadian child with her father and mother to sail down the Saugeen river on a raft from Paisley to Southampton, is the unique distinction enjoyed by Mrs Elizabeth Rowe McIntyre of 152 Indian Road, Toronto, who celebrated her 81st birthday Monday last. She is in the best of health and in possession of all her faculties. Mrs. McIntyre first saw the light of day in Egremont Township and later, moved with the family to Paisley, where she lived for many years and where many of her relatives still reside.
