The question of protection of labor in Palestine bobbed up again in the British House of Commons when Miss Susan Lawrence, a Labor M.P., demanded to know of the Colonial Office if the draft of the contract with Moses Novomejsky for the exploitation of the salts of the Dead Sea contained a fair wage clause, say a London dispatch of March 5 to The Jewish Telegraph Agency.

Major Ormsby Gore replied in the negative, but added that any concession granted would be subject to future legislation of a general character affecting employment conditions in Palestine and Transjordan. However, the concessionaire was not obliged to accept conditions other than the law imposes.

Miss Lawrence further asked whether a law had been introduced recently concerning corporal punishment. Major Ormsby Gore replied in the affirmative, stating that a recent law reduced the number of offenses for which corporal punishment may be inflicted.
