Several others which were damaged were recommended to be repaired, and where necessary, three-foot corrugated pipe will be placed.

The engineer will be called in as soon as possible to attend to this work, so that it may be completed with the least inconvenience to citizens of the township.

Holland, Holland Centre, Sept. 12; Osprey, Faversham, Sept. 13; Artemesia, Flesherston, Sept. 14; Egremont at Holstein, Sept. 16; Normanby at Ayton, Sept. 17; Ephrasias at Rocklyn, Sept. 19; Sullivan at Deaboro, Sept. 20; Bentinck at Lamash, Sept. 21; North Proton at Venash, Sept. 23; South Proton, Cedarville, Sept. 24; Glenelg, Edge Hill, Sept. 25; Markdale at Markdale, Oct 2nd. Besides cash prizes and ribbons given at each school fair held, there are cash prizes of \$350, two silver cups, 2 gold watches, at champion fair and following: certificates of honor; T. Eaton trophies, to be given at each school centre and schools entering same, new features for contests follow: month organ, open to the boys and girls; folk dance by two from each school; spelling match, one child from each school with the exception of Sarawak, when three children from each are allowed. First aid competition (boys only) demonstrate artificial respiration following accident by drowning; demonstrate treatment for simple fracture of arm above elbow. Girls only: demonstrate proper method of treating a wound on the bottom of foot; demonstrate treatment of a burn. Mr J. C. Mercer, Markdale, is giving a cash prize to the boy winning most points at championship school fair.

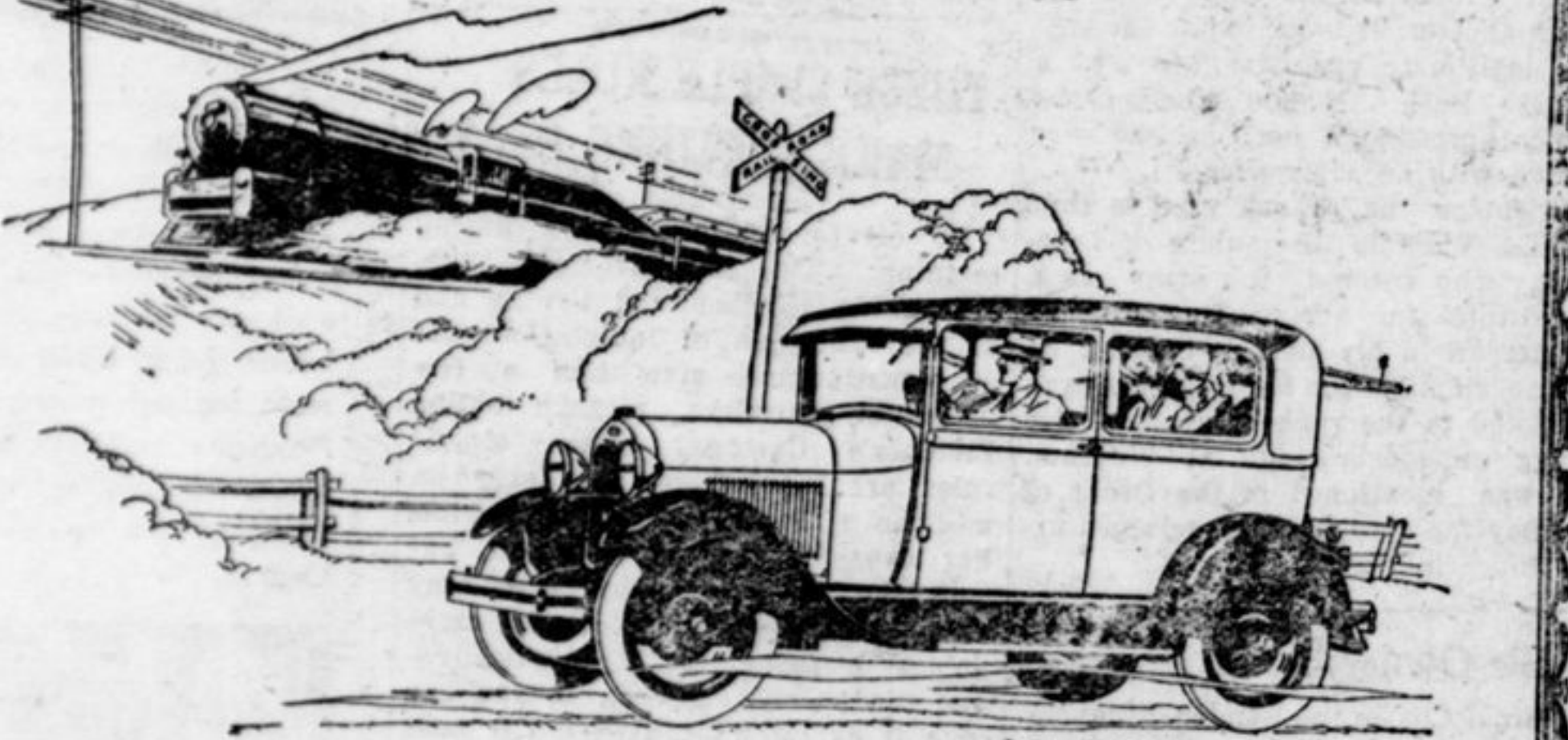
