Labor Saving Mulches and Cultivation Hints

WATCH CLAY SOIL

Mulch Saves Labor Where the garden is very large and it is worth while to effect a saving in hand labor, or where one is going to be away, a good deal of the time, a practical plan is to mulch between the rows of vegetables or clumps of flowers with straw. Vegetables, particularly those which yield fruits lying on or close to the ground, will be much cleaner when grown in this Straw, lawn clippings, or leaves are spread over the earth to a depth of between four and six inches after the plants are well grown. This mulch will keep down weeds and will conserve moisture. When one is going away for two or three weeks in the middle of a hot summer, spreading the lawn clippings over the earth in the garden like this is particularly advisable in order to conserve moisture and prevent the plants from becoming stunted. With those plants which will not permit deep cultivation on account of spreading roots close to the surface, mulching is also valuable.

Cultivation for Peas

Peas whether of the flower or vegetable sort require very deep cultivation. The plants thrive in cool soil, and this deep cultivation allows the roots to penetrate to a considerable depth away from the hot soil at the top. With April nearly over it is time to think about getting in the earlier types in the vegetable line. The first of these will be the round-podded sorts which will stand slightly more frost than the finer quality wrinkled Except for a very few early rows, which will not be any great loss if they are destroyed, it is wise to delay planting until the cold, damp weather is over, as the seed is liable to got in the ground. In the very small garden peas are hardly practiand as they take up more room in proportion to results than such vegetanles as carrots, beans, or beets. It is only out of a near-by garden, however, that one will get ' first-class quality, as peas lose their flavor very quickly after being picked. On this account they are often given room even where space is limited. The same rule applies to bush fruits, strawberries and hérbaceous perennials. Once the soil loses the moisture of early spring and the hot dry winds commence, a much larger proportion of plants is likely to die

than if planted earlier.

Care of the Soil Serious harm will result if one rushes the season and gets into the garden too early. On lay soil particularly there is grave danger of puddling the earth and causing it to bake. When this happens-the result of working the clay when still dampthe soil will never work up nicely that When the soil crumbles readily after being squeezed between the hand it is ready for the spade or plow and not before. If the soil is a very heavy clay loosen up by digging in plenty of strawy manure, leaves, waste garden material or even a light drossing of coal ashes. If very light, the incorporation of humius-decayed vegetable matter-is advisable. For certain types of flower and most vegetables too, for that matter, tile drainage should be provided in heavy clay soils, and it may be neecssary where an expensive rose garden is to be laid out to place a layer of gravel a foot beneath the surface.

What is a Canadian?

Saint John Telegraph-Journal (Ind.): (The United States Supreme Court apparently holds that all Canadian citizens are either native-born or naturalized.) There is, however, a third category neither native-born nor naturalized. This is by no means numerically small. It is composed of British-born Canadians whose birthplace happens to be outside Canada, but not in a "foreign' country as the term is understood and used in the Dominion. That these are in a class separate from the foreign-born is evidenced by the fact that they need no naturalization, being already British. It is difficult to accept birthplace as the sole gauge of nationality. Is it, for instance, to be held that a child born in Turkey of Canadianborn parents is a Turk?
